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#### ***1.1 INTRODUCTION***

This unit presents a broad survey of concepts and terminology related to today's digital computers. Here, the idea of computer literacy is introduced. You will find what a computer is and what it does. You will learn about computer generations, applications of computer, components and categories of a computer (including personal computers, minicomputers, mainframe computers, and supercomputers) and etc. This unit also covers the usefulness of computers, different functional units of a computer, etc.

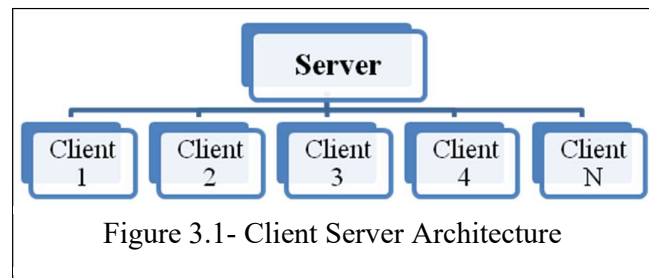

## 1.3 COMPUTER NETWORKS

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Networking is a process of connecting two or more devices and allows the sharing of data/information. A computer network is a collection of computers or network devices; connected to one another for the purpose of sharing information among them. If you want to understand network in real life, so Internet is an excellent example of the network.

Networking is used to share resources (software and hardware both) such as- file, documents, e-mail, printer, storage, etc. The computer network may be connected using wires/cables



(telephone lines, cable TV, fiber optics, etc) or wireless (radio waves, satellite, infrared beams, etc).

Broadly there are two basic forms of computer network design/architecture. As-

- Client server architecture
- Peer-to-peer architecture

In client server network architecture, every computer has a distinct role: that of either a client or a server. A server is featured as a centralized storage, that stores- email, Web pages, files, applications; and designed to share its resources among the client computers on the network. A client computer can communicate only with server computers. A server (or Server Computer) is a single computer or group of servers that are interconnected. A server runs a special network operating system- such as: Windows Server, Linux, UNIX, etc; which is designed to facilitate sharing of its resources among its clients. Figure 3.1 shows client server architecture with single server and 'N' clients.

A peer-to-peer (P2P) network is created when two or more computers are connected and share resources without using a separate server computer. Peers are both suppliers and consumers of resources, in contrast to the client-server model in which the consumption and supply of resources is divided in to server and clients respectively.

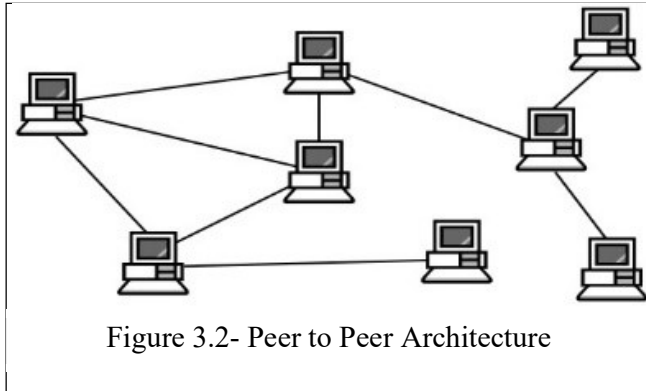


Figure 3.2- Peer to Peer Architecture

### Advantages of Computer Network-

- A network provides the means to exchange data/information among the computers.
- It permits the sharing of the resources of the machine.
- A network provides multiple users to access same data at the same time from same or different locations.
- Video Conferencing is possible through a network

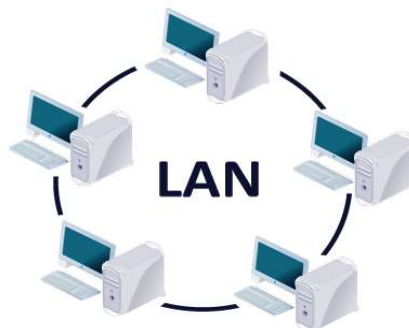
### Disadvantages of Computer Network-

- Risk of security issues.
- It encourages people to become dependent on computers.
- A network fault can cause loss of data.
- Complex structure and costlier.

### Types of Computer Network

#### Local Area Network (LAN)

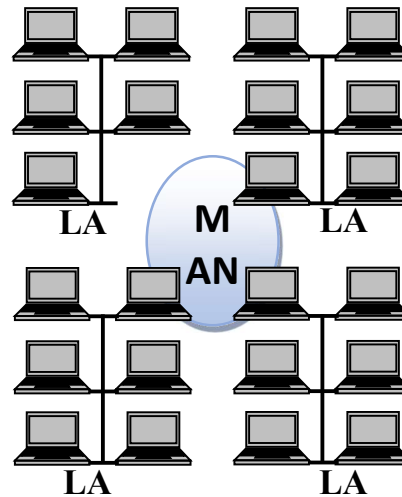
A LAN is a network that is used for communicating among computer devices, usually within an office building or home. It typically consists of several devices (such as-



computers and printers) connected to one another in a network. It enables the sharing of resources such as files or hardware devices that may be needed by multiple users. LANs are the most common form of networks found in most small businesses, offices and schools. A LAN can be connected using wired or wireless, when it is connected as wireless then it is named WLAN (Wireless).

### Metropolitan Area Network (MAN)

It consists of two or more LANs connected together using high-speed (1.544 Mbps to 155 Mbps) transmission lines. It connects smaller networks (LAN) within a city or town. It is similar to a LAN in a sense that it connects computers but larger in size because it connects two or more LANs in a certain geographic area. A MAN might be owned and operated by a single organization and typically covers an area of 5 to 50 kilometer in diameter. Examples: Telephone company network, Cable TV network, etc.



### Wide Area Network (WAN)

It covers a large geographic area such as country, continent or even whole of the world. A WAN is consisting of two or more MANs connected together; as same the MAN is consisting of two or more LANs are connected together. WAN overcome the distance limitations by transmitting data over leased high-speed phone lines or wireless links such as satellites. WANs can use either analog (telephone lines) or digital (such as satellite transmission) signals, or a combination of both.

### Applications of Computer Networks-

- It provides a reliable communication medium.
- It provides resource sharing.
- It is used for serving information in remote locations.
- It is used for social media and communication such as e-mail, chatting, video conferencing, messaging, etc.
- It is used for electronic banking.

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## 1.4 COMPUTER NETWORK TOPOLOGIES

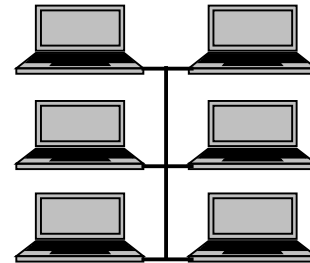
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The topology of a network is the geometric representation of all the links and connected devices in a network to one another. In other words, network topology is an arrangement of network devices those are used to transmit data in a network and it also presents the structure of a network. The layout of the network connection is based on the fact that how the data is being

transmitted and how are the devices linked to each other. There are the following types of network topology-

### Bus Topology-

A bus topology is a multipoint connection, one long cable acts as a backbone to connect all the devices in a network. Nodes are connected to the bus cable by drop lines and taps. A drop line is a connection between the device and the main cable and a tap is a connector that either splices into the main cable or punctures the sheathing of a cable to create a connection with main bus. Number of taps and distance between them is limited. Basically, bus topology is popular in LAN (Local Area Network) where a greater number of nodes are connected using a single cable.

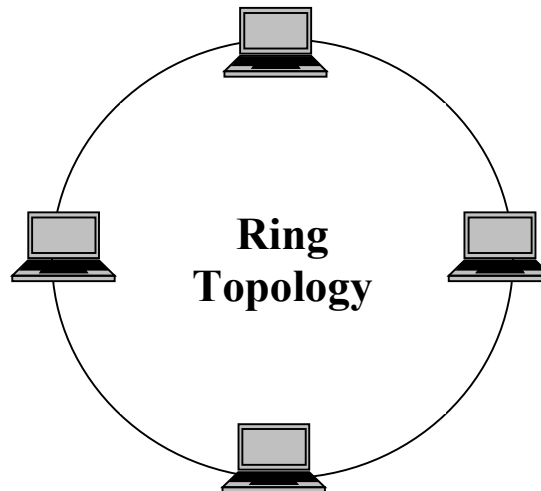


### Advantages-

- It is easy to install/configure.
- It uses less cabling than mesh or star topology.

### Disadvantages-

- Difficult to reconnection and fault isolation.
- Signal reflection at the taps can cause degradation in quality.
- Adding new devices sometimes may cause modification or replacement of the backbone.
- A fault or break in the bus/backbone cable stops all transmission in a network.



### Ring Topology

In a ring topology, each device has a dedicated point-to-point connection with only the two devices on either side of it. A signal is passed along the ring in one direction, from device to device, until it reaches its destination.

### Advantages-

- It is easy to install and reconfigure.
- Each node has equal access to resources.
- It reduces chances of collision of data packets.

### Disadvantages-

- If one node or port goes down, the entire network gets affected.



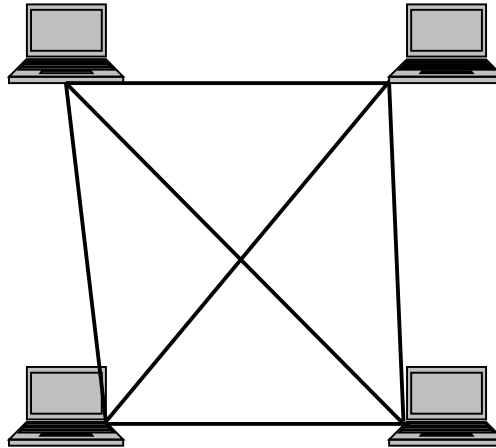
- Network is highly dependent on the wire which connects different components.
- Slower in data transmission in comparison to other networks.

### Mesh Topology-

In a mesh topology, every device (Computer or node) has a dedicated point-to-point link to every other device. The term dedicated means that the link carries data traffic only between the two devices it connects.

#### Advantages-

- A mesh topology uses dedicated links which guarantees each connection can carry its own data load.
- It eliminates the data traffic problems because of dedicated links.
- A mesh topology is robust because if one link becomes unusable, it does not incapacitate the entire system.
- It provides secure communication among stations, when each message travels along a dedicated line, only the intended recipient sees it.
- A point-to-point links make fault identification and fault isolation easy.



#### Disadvantages-

- Amount of cabling and input/output ports used is too much.
- Installation and reconnection is difficult.
- It is too expensive; because hardware (cable and I/O ports) required connecting each link is much larger.
- It is usually implemented in a limited fashion.

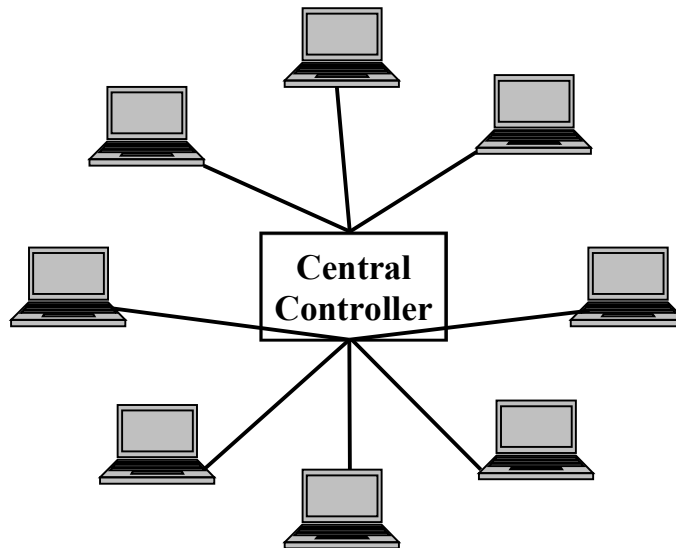
### Star Topology-

In a star topology, each device has a dedicated point-to-point link only to a central controller, usually called a hub or switch. The devices are not directly linked to one another. It does not allow direct data traffic/transmission between devices. The central controller acts as an exchange: If one device wants to send data to another, it sends the data to the controller, which then relays the data to the other connected device.

#### Advantages-

- A star topology is less expensive than a mesh topology.

- In a star topology, each device needs only one link and one I/O port to connect it to any number of other devices.
- Easy to install and reconfigure, if one link fails, only that link is affected.
- It needs less cabling and easy to fault identification & isolation.



#### Disadvantages-

- Fully dependent on one single point, called the central hub/switch.
- If the central hub goes down, the whole system is unable to work.

## 1.5 HARDWARE DEVICES USED IN COMPUTER NETWORKS

### Hub-

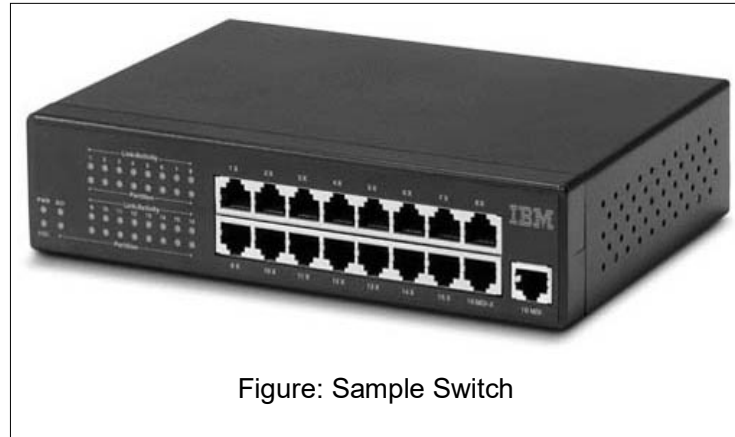
A hub connects multiple wires in a Local Area Network (LAN) coming from different nodes. For example- the hub connects different stations in star topology. A Hub cannot filter data packets, received from different stations, so that the data packets are sent to all connected devices; which leads increasing data traffic and wastage of resources. Also, a hub cannot

find best path for data packets to deliver it into destination. Hub only supports half duplex, which means at a same point of time only one way communication possible. In addition to that, a hub operates at the physical layer of the OSI/RM (Open System Interconnection / Reference Model).

Hubs are comes in two categories- Active Hub and Passive hub. Most hubs are active hubs, which are also called multiport repeaters. It functions in the same way as a repeater, except that

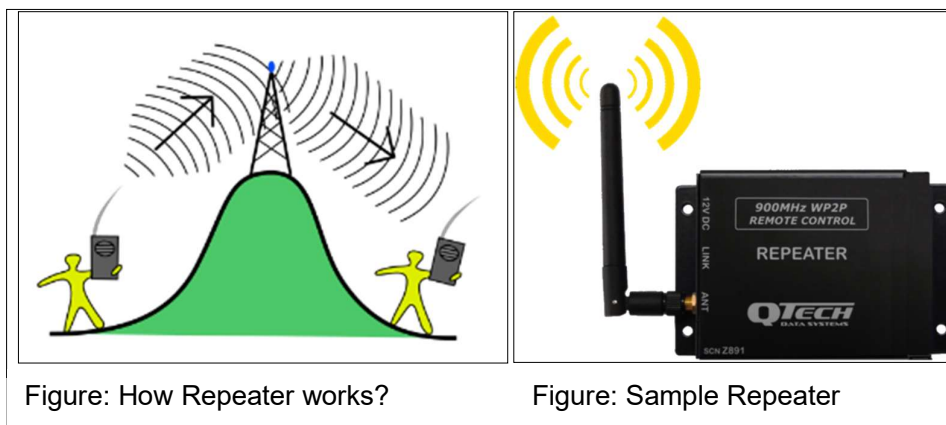


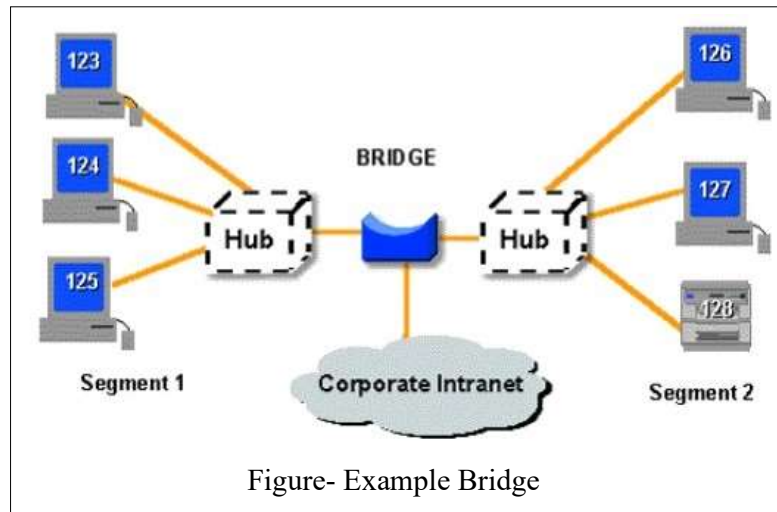
it must also broadcast the regenerated signals to all connected nodes/stations rather than forwarding them to just one node/station. A passive hub provides no signal regeneration, it simply serves as a conduit for data and broadcast incoming data to every other port.

### Switch-

A switch is a connecting device which is somehow works in the place of a hub. Unlike hub, switches work on the layer 2 (data link layer) of the OSI model and also follows full duplex (two-way communication at the same point of time) mode. Switches works on local area network to connect different nodes and also network types (such as Ethernet and Fast Ethernet) or networks of the same type. It filters each packet and processes it accordingly.

### Repeater-





A repeater is an electronic device that receives the signal and regenerates it, so that the signal can cover longer distances. It operates at the physical layer of the OSI/RM. When the signal becomes weak, it (repeater) copies the signal bit by bit and regenerates it at the original strength.

### Bridge-

A bridge connects a local area network (LAN) to another local area network and also controls data flow between them. It works at the data-link layer of the OSI model. Bridges can operate only in half duplex mode where as a switch operates in both half or full duplex mode. Bridges are important to connect different LANs in one network, so that they can become part of the whole network. A bridge sometimes also known as 'brouter', it is used as a combination of router and bridge both. Brouters are the earlier implementation of the routers.

### Router-

Router is a network device (works on network layer of OSI model) that routes data packets

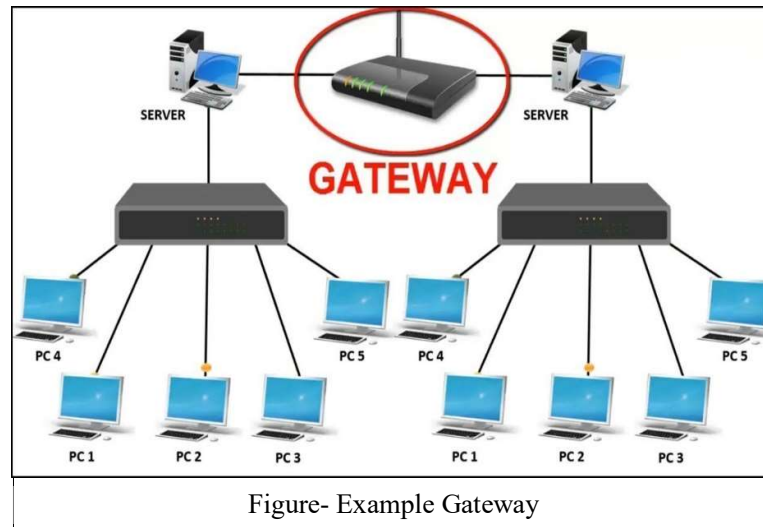


around the network. A router has ability to connect dissimilar LANs with same protocol. It processes logical addressing information (IP address) in the Network header of a data packet.

A router manages its routing table which can be built statically or dynamically. A router keeps record of the path that a data packets can use as it moves across the network, this type of records are maintained in a table known as routing table. A router can determine the destination address for the data packet and then, by using tables of defined routes (routing table), the router determines the optimal way for the data packet to forward it next or to its destination.

### Gateway-

A gateway is used to connect two or more networks using different protocols together; where



as a bridge is used to connect two similar types of networks. The term gateway is applied to any device or software application that can perform the function of translating data from one format to another without changing the data itself. For example- you can understand the working of a router that connects a home/local area network to WAN/Internet.

Current use of Internet is becoming quite popular for accessing information on any topic of your interest. Nowadays, most of the users who have computers around themselves use Internet to access information from the World Wide Web, exchange messages & documents and e-services.

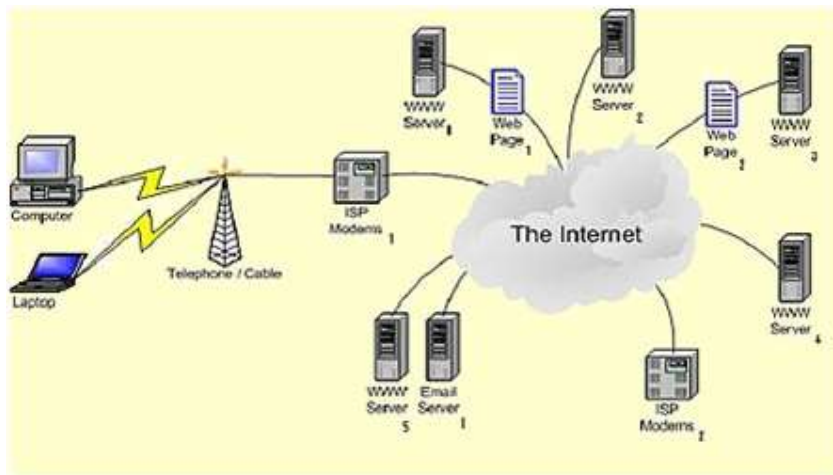


Figure 4.2: Simple diagram of Internet

The internet is a collection of many small networks through which one host can be connected to another host anywhere in the world to share all kinds of information such as text, images, audio, video etc. The internet is the largest computer network of many small private, public, academic, business and government networks of computers. In the present age of information Technology, use of Internet is becoming quite popular for accessing information on any topic of your interest. It also provides tremendous opportunities to students; researchers and professionals for getting information on matters related to academic and professional topics and lot more. The origins of the Internet date back to research commissioned by the United States Federal Government in the 1960s to build robust, fault-tolerant communication via computer networks. The linking of commercial networks and enterprises in the early 1990s marked the beginning of the transition to the modern Internet, and generated rapid growth as institutional, personal, and mobile computers were connected to the network. By the late 2000s, its services and technologies had been incorporated into virtually every aspect of human lives.

The Internet is aimed at enabling the interconnection and integration of the physical world and the cyberspace. It represents the trend of future networking, and leads the third wave of the IT industry revolution. Today everywhere we can see internet.

## 2.3 WHAT IS INTERNET?

“The network of networks is called an internet”.

“The Internet or simply the Net is a worldwide network of computer networks. It is an interconnection of large and small networks around the world”. We will discuss common internet terms to help you understand the relationship of various Internet technologies.

### Important terms used in Internet-

#### World Wide Web (WWW)

WWW is the abbreviation of World Wide Web. The World Wide Web is a set of electronic documents (called web pages) that are attached together like a spider web. These web pages are saved on computer and those computers are called server which are located around all over the world.

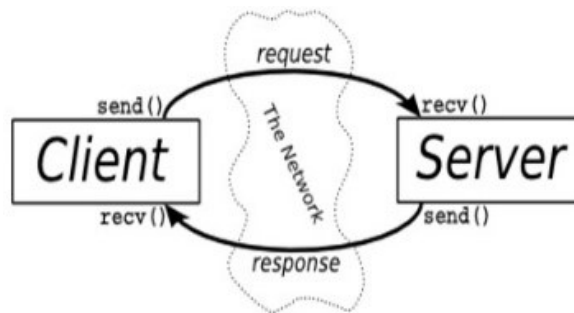


Figure 4.3: Client Server architecture

#### Web Server

A Web Server is responsible for stores web pages and it is also responsible for accepting request(s) from host computer and serves them with web pages. Two main web server application are: IIS (Internet Information server) and Apache, etc. Web servers are connected to the Internet all the time.

#### Hyperlink

Hyperlink is an icon, graphic, or text in a document that links to another file or object. It is an electronic document that connected to another place in the same document or to an entirely different document. Hyperlinks usually display as underlined text and in an altered colour, but they may also appear as graphics, such as buttons to click. Hyperlinks may be used to connect another place in the same document, or another page, to play an audio or video file, to download a file, to set up a message to an e-mail address, and to connect the other Internet resources.

#### HTML (Hypertext Markup Language)

It is a language that consists of certain key words called ‘Tags’, used for writing the documents on the web. We will discuss in Unit 6 of this book.

#### Web Page

A web page (such as the one you are looking at now) is an electronic document written in a computer language called HTML (Hypertext Markup Language). Web pages can contain text, graphics, video, animation, and sound, as well as interactive features, such as data entry forms. Each page has a unique address known as a URL (Uniform Resource Locator) that identifies its location on the server. Web pages usually contain hyperlinks to other web pages.

### **Website**

A website (often shortened to just site) is one or more web pages, belonging to a particular company, institute, government or an individual. The first page is called the home page, which acts like an index, indicating the content on the site. By default the home page is named as index.htm. From the home page, you can click hyperlinks to access other web pages.

### **Evolution of the Internet-**

The process of development of internet was initiated in 1969, when U.S. Department of Defence initiated a project named Advance Research Project Network (ARPANET). The major purpose of the ARPANET model was to develop a continuous communication channel for researchers of different universities by creating computer network which can link computers at different university and U.S. defence. ARPANET was initiated with a small number of computers but it expanded rapidly as the huge number of researchers from hundreds of colleges and universities started sharing information's and data through its networks.

Then in mid 80's another central organization, the National Science Foundation, created a new, more superior and high power network called NSFnet. Later, large number of personal companies started their own networks, which were later interrelated along with ARPANET and NSFnet to form internet and its protocols to ensure transferring of information over the world wide network as unread.

### **Purpose of the Internet-**

Internet has been the mainly helpful technology of the modern times which helps us not only in our day by day life, but also our private and professional lives developments. The internet gives us achieve this in various different ways. For the students and institutional purposes the internet is broadly used to gather information so as to do the research or add to the information of various subjects. Even in the business fields and the professionals like doctors, access the internet to filter the compulsory knowledge for their use. The internet is therefore the major encyclopaedia for every person, in all age categories. The internet has offers to be more helpful in maintaining contacts with relatives who live abroad permanently. Some of the typical tasks that Internet can perform. As-

- Transfer files as well as software.

- Browse through information on any topic on web.
- Communicate in real time (chat) with others connected to the Internet.
- Search databases of government, individuals and organizations.
- Read news available from leading news groups.
- Send or receive animation and picture files from distant places.
- Set up a site with information about your company's products and services.

### Benefits of the Internet-

### Boundaries of Internet-

- **Theft of personal information**

If you use internet, your personal information such as your name, address, credit card, bank details and other information can be accessed by unauthorized person.

- **Negative effects on family communication**

It is generally observed that due to more time spent on Internet, there is a decrease in communication and feeling of togetherness among the family members.

- **Internet addiction**

There is some controversy over whether it is possible to actually be addicted to the Internet or not. Some researchers claim that it is simply people trying to escape their problems in an online world.

- **Children using the Internet**

It has become a big concern. Most parents do not realize the dangers involved when their children log onto the Internet. When children talk to others online, they do not realize they could actually be talking to a harmful person. Moreover, pornography is also a very serious issue concerning the Internet, especially when it comes to young children. There are many pornographic sites on the Internet that can be easily found and can be a detriment to letting children uses the Internet.

- **Virus threat**

Today, not only are humans getting viruses, but computers are also. Computers are mainly getting these viruses from the Internet. Virus is a program which disrupts

the normal functioning of your computer systems. Computers attached to internet are more prone to virus attacks and they can end up into crashing your whole hard disk.

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## 2.4 INTERNET PROTOCOL (IP) ADDRESS

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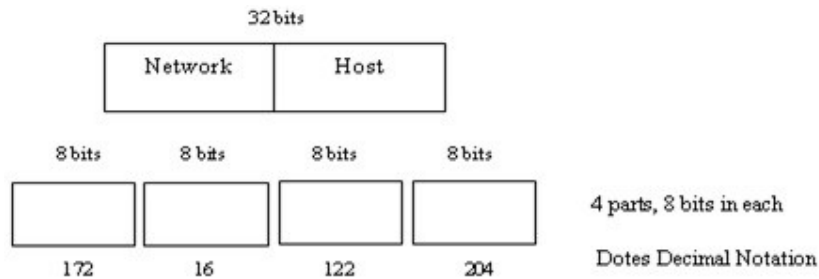
A protocol means set of rules and guidelines for some particular task. In computing (Computer science), a protocol or communication protocol is a set of rules in which computers communicate with each other. The protocol says what part of the conversation comes at which time. Some examples of internet protocols are-

- HTTP (Hypertext Transfer Protocol)
- HTTPS (Hypertext Transfer Protocol Secured)
- TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol)
- FTP (File Transfer Protocol)
- IMAP (Internet Message Access Protocol)
- POP (Post Office Protocol)
- SMTP (Simple Mail Transfer Protocol)
- TELNET (Telecommunications Network)
- UDP (User Datagram Protocol)
- NNTP (Network News Transfer Protocol)
- MAC (Media Access Control protocol)
- DNS (Domain Name System protocol)
- DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol)

In widely installed phase of the Internet Protocol (IP) today, an IP address is a 32-bit number that recognize each sender or receiver of information that is sent in packets across the Internet. When you request an HTML page or send e-mail, the Internet Protocol part of TCP/IP consist your IP address in the message (actually, in each of the packets if more than one is required) and sends it to the IP address that is obtained by looking up the domain name in the url you can requested or in the e-mail address you're sending a message. At the other end, host can see the IP address of the Web page requestor or the e-mail sending host and can reply by sending another message using the IP address it fetched. 32 bits IP address categories into parts network id and host id.

The 32-bit IP address is clubbed eight bits at a time, separated by dots and represented in decimal format. This is known as dotted decimal technique as shown in figure below. The 32-bit number is separated in two parts as Network part and Host part.

## The Network part of the Internet Protocol Address-



### IP Address Format

The Internet is particularly the interconnection of many individual networks (it's sometimes referred to as an internetwork). So, the Internet Protocol (IP) is primarily the collection of protocols for one network communicating with any other. Each network must know its own address on the Internet and that of any other networks with which it communicates. To be component of the Internet, a group needs an Internet network number. This expulsion network number is in any packet combined out of the network onto the Internet.

## The Local or Host Part of the IP Address-

In addition to the network address or number, information is need about which particular host in a network is sending or receiving an information. So, the IP address requires both the unique network number and a host number (which is unique within the network). The host number is most of the times called a local address. Element of the local address can be identified a sub network or subnet address, which makes it easier for a network that is categorized into mainly physical subnetworks (for examples, several different local area networks) to handle many devices. This IP addresses divided into four classes.

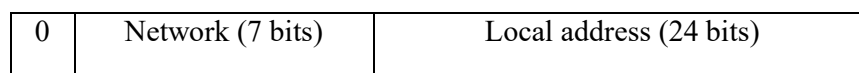
## IP Address Classes and Their Formats-

Since networks vary in size, there are four different address formats or classes to consider when applying to NIC for a network number as

- **Class A** addresses are for large networks with many devices.
- **Class B** addresses are for medium-sized networks.
- **Class C** addresses are for small networks (fewer than 256 devices).
- **Class D** addresses are multicast addresses

The first few bits of each IP address indicate which of the address class formats it is using. The address structures look like this:

### Class A



Note-

Ques1: What is the total number of IP addresses present in class A?

Ans1: IP address is 32 bit number in which first bit is fixed so we have only 31 bits. Using 31 bit we can generate  $2^{31}$  numbers. So class A has  $2^{31}$  IP addresses.

Ques2: How many networks present in class A?

Ans2: Class A has 128 networks.

The IP address is usually expressed as four decimal numbers, each representing eight bits, separated by periods. This is sometimes known as the dot address and, more technically, as dotted quad notation. For Class A IP addresses, the numbers would represent "network.local.local.local" for a Class C IP address, they would represent "network.network.network.local". The number version of the IP address can (and usually is) represented by a name or series of names called the domain name.

### **Static versus Dynamic IP Addresses-**

The discussion above assumes that IP addresses are assigned on a static basis. In fact, many IP addresses are assigned dynamically from a pool. Many corporate networks and online services economize on the number of IP addresses they use by sharing a pool of IP addresses among a large number of users. If you're an America Online user, for example, your IP address will vary from one logon session to the next because AOL is assigning it to you from a pool that is much smaller than AOL's base of subscribers.

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## ***2.5 TYPES OF INTERNET CONNECTION***

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Any terminal to activate an internet service on it require an internet connection from an Internet Service Provider. To have a connection one needs to contact the Internet Service Providers. There are several Internet Service Providers (ISP) in each locality. There are some nominal charges that you need to pay to the ISP for the installation of the connection and for the rent (either monthly or annually). Depending on the requirement you choose any one of the available options. If you need a high speed dedicated network then you can opt for a high bandwidth broadband or leased line connection.

If you need to have connection on a single PC then you choose a low bandwidth or dialup

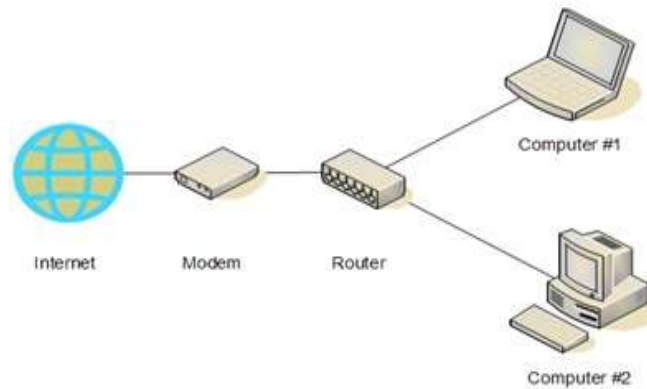


Figure 4.6: Internet and its peripherals

connection. For small services at your hand, you can even have mobile phones connected to your Internet. There are many ways to get connected to the Internet. You can get internet connection in any of the following ways-

#### **Through dial-up connection-**

User is supposed to get connected to the internet after dialling up the number used for connection. This is useful if your network is either confined to small group of computers or for a single PC.

#### **Through leased lines-**

In this connection a dedicated line is laid specifically for connection.

#### **Though broadband-**

In this connection you can get a broadband connection which provides a high bandwidth for the internet connection. This also provides a good data speed.

These days even wireless connections are available. For this you need to have a Wi-Fi card attached to your computer which can be useful if you do not have proper place to lay down the wires.

To connect to the Internet you need a PC (personal computer) with requisite software including a browser, a telephone connection or a leased line, and a modem, which allows the PC to communicate with other computers. There exist several ways to connect to the internet. Following are these connection types available:

- Dial-up Connection
- ISDN
- DSL
- Cable TV Internet connections
- Satellite Internet connections
- Wireless Internet Connections

#### **Dial-up Connection-**

Dial-up connection uses telephone line to connect PC to the internet. It requires a modem to

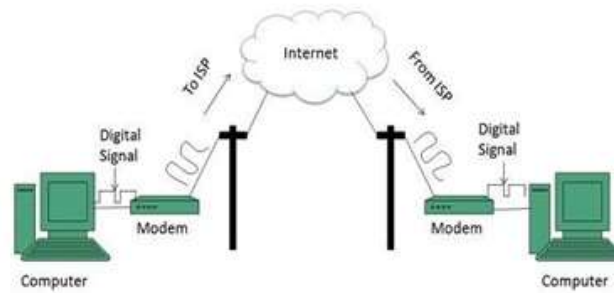


Figure 4.7: Internet Access Dial-up Connection Modem

setup dial-up connection. This modem works as an interface between PC and the telephone line. There is also a communication program that instructs the modem to make a call to specific number provided by an ISP.

Dial-up connection uses either of the following protocols: Serial Line Internet Protocol (SLIP), Point to Point Protocol (PPP)

### ISDN-

ISDN is acronym of Integrated Services Digital Network. It establishes the connection using the phone lines which carry digital signals instead of analog signals. There are two techniques

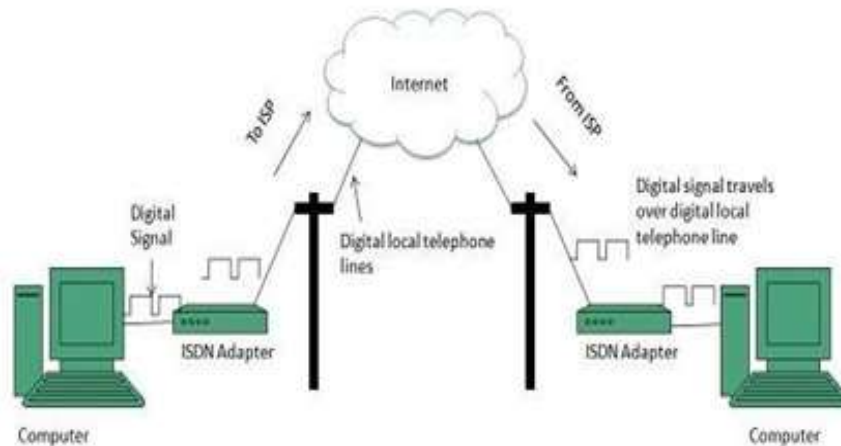


Figure 4.8: Internet Access ISDN Modem

to deliver ISDN services: Basic Rate Interface (BRI) and Primary Rate Interface (PRI).

### DSL (Digital Subscriber Line)-

DSL is acronym of Digital Subscriber Line. It is a form of broadband connection as it provides connection over ordinary telephone lines. Following are the several versions of DSL technique available today:

- Asymmetric DSL (ADSL)

- Symmetric DSL (SDSL)
- High bit-rate DSL (HDSL)
- Rate adaptive DSL (RDSL)
- Very high bit-rate DSL (VDSL)
- ISDN DSL (IDSL)

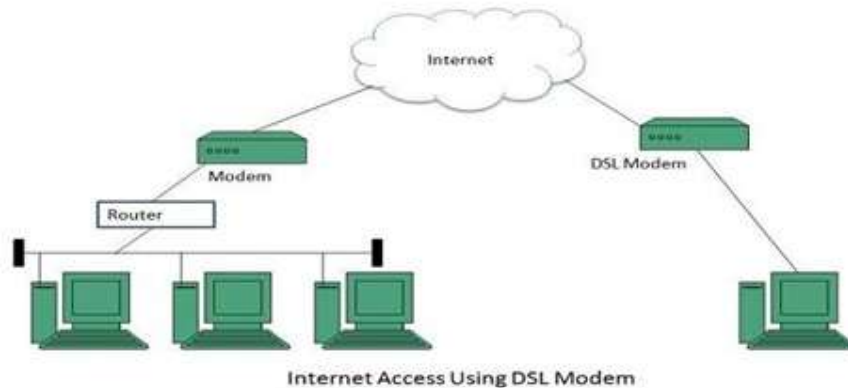


Figure 4.9: Cable TV Internet Connection

Cable TV The Internet connection is provided through Cable TV lines. It uses coaxial cable which is capable of transferring data at much higher speed than common telephone line. The following diagram shows that how internet is accessed using Cable TV connection:

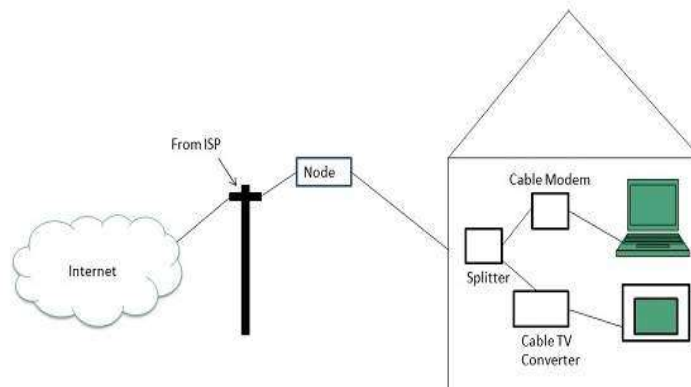


Figure 4.10: Cable TV Internet connections

### Satellite Internet Connection-

Satellite Internet connection offers high speed connection to the internet. There are two types of satellite internet connection: one way connection or two-way connection. In one way connection, we can only download data but if we want to upload, we need a dialup access through ISP over telephone line. In two-way connection, we can download and upload the data

by the satellite. It does not require any dialup connection. The following diagram shows how internet is accessed using satellite internet connection:

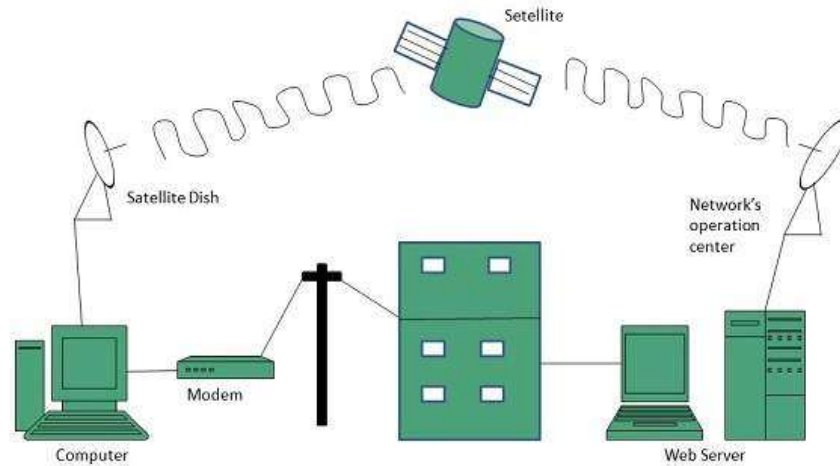


Figure 4.11: Satellite Internet Connection

### Wireless Internet Connection-

Wireless Internet Connection makes use of radio frequency bands to connect to the internet and offers a very high speed. The wireless internet connection can be obtained by either Wi-Fi or Bluetooth.

## 2.6 WORLD WIDE WEB

WWW, this is abbreviation of World Wide Web and also known as web. It came into existence 1991. The father of www is Tim Berners Lee in the European laboratory. In June 1993, the web boasted just 130 sites and in the next year, this was 3000 sites and at the last of April 1998, this became 2.2 million.

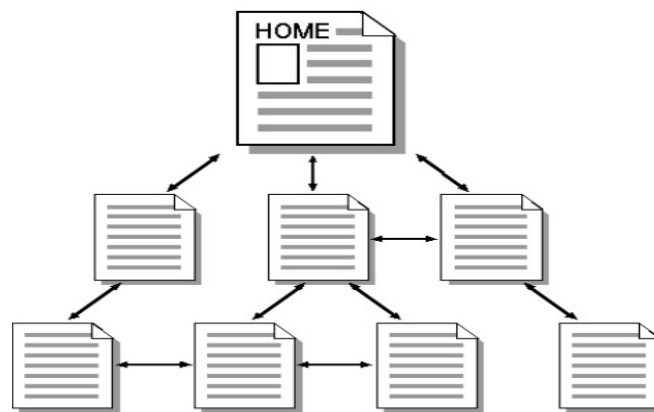

Just as each household in the world has unique address, same as each web page in the world has a unique Internet address, sometimes called a URL. For example, the internet address of windows home page is <http://www.microsoft.com/windows>. Some important terms related to Internet are

- **Download-** To copy data from remote computer to a local computer.
- **Upload-** To send data from a local computer to a remote computer.
- **Filter-** Software that allows targeted sites to be blocked from view.
- **Home Page-** This is the beginning page of any site.
- **Email (Electronic Mail)-**
- **HTML (Hyper Text Markup Language)-** This is used to create documents for use on the World Wide Web.
- **Search Engine-** A web server that collects data from other web servers, it provides links to pages that contain the object of your search.
- **TCP/IP-** This is also known as transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol. TCP/IP is basically used for communication language or protocol for Internet. When you make up a connection to Internet, your computer provides a copy of TCP/IP program to all other computers who want to communicate.
- **URL (Uniform Resource Locator)-** Every server on the Internet has an IP number that is an IP number divided into four parts separated by dots. IP number is the server address.

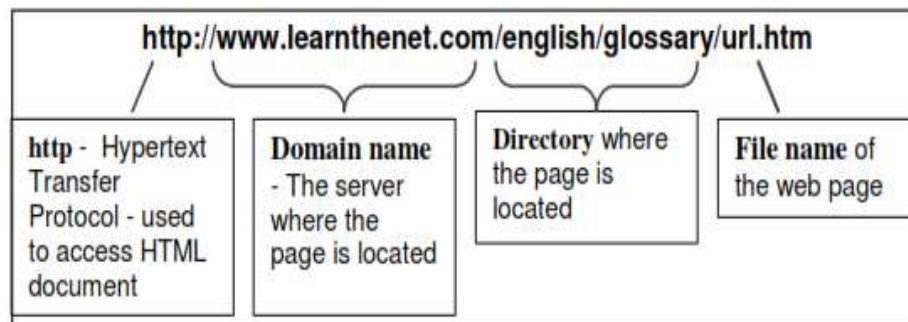


Figure 4.13: A Sample of URL

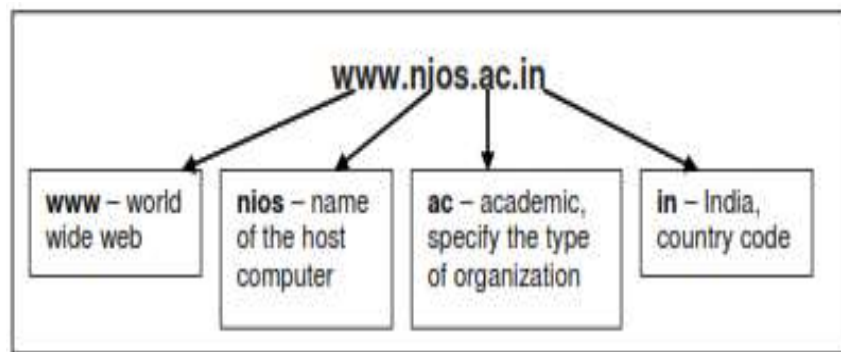

## 2.7 E-MAIL

E-mail or Electronic mail is a paperless method of sending messages, notes or letters from one person to another or even many people at the same time via Internet. E-mail is very fast compared to the normal post. E-mail messages usually take only few seconds to arrive at their destination. One can send messages anytime of the day or night, and, it will get delivered immediately. You need not to wait for the post office to open and you don't have to get worried about holidays. It works 24 hours a day and seven days a week. What's more, the copy of the message you have sent will be available whenever you want to look at it even in the middle of the night. You have the privilege of sending something extra such as a file, graphics, images etc. along with your e-mail. The biggest advantage of using e-mail is that it is cheap, especially when sending messages to other states or countries and at the same time it can be delivered to a number of people around the world.

It allows you to compose note, get the address of the recipient and send it. Once the mail is received and read, it can be forwarded or replied. One can even store it for later use, or delete. In e-mail even the sender can request for delivery receipt and read receipt from the recipient.

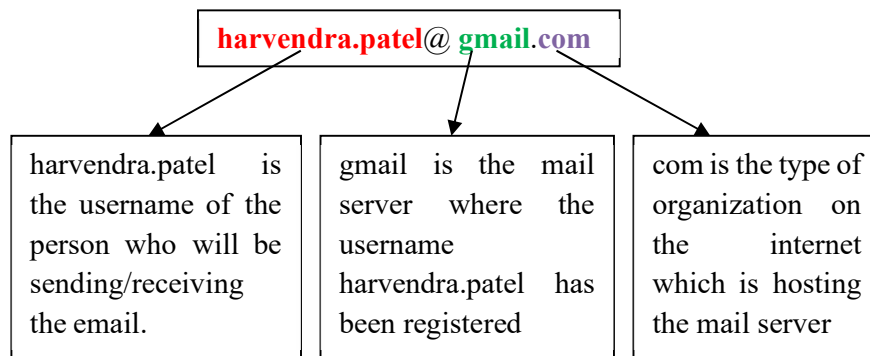
## Features of E-mail

## Components of an E-mail Address

As in the case of normal mail system, e-mail is also based upon the concept of a recipient address. The email address provides all of the information required to get a message to the recipient from anywhere in the world. Consider the e-mail ID.

## 2.8 WEB BROWSER

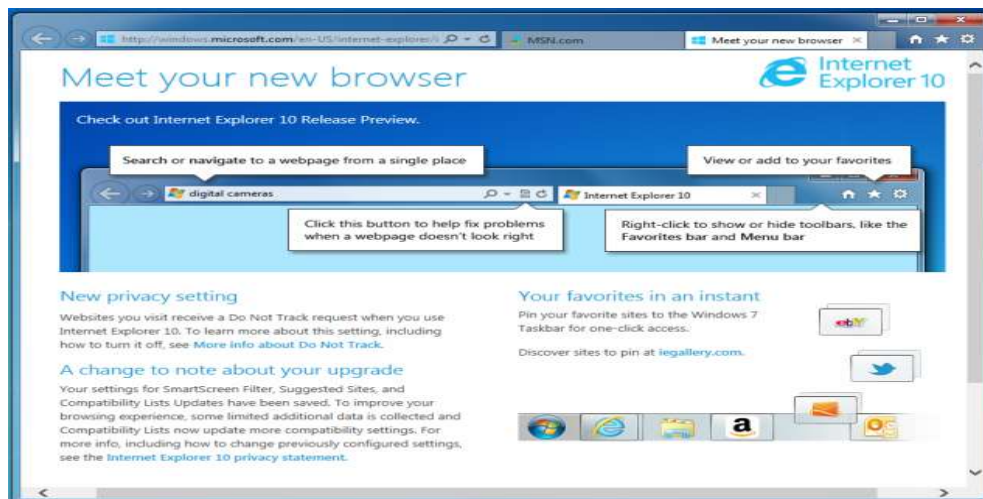




Figure 4.15: Microsoft Internet Explorer

Contain the basic software you need in order to find, retrieve, view and send information over the Internet. Most popular browsers were Microsoft Internet Explorer, Netscape Navigator. To open browser Microsoft Internet Explorer: click on start→All Programs →Internet Explorer

A web browser defines as "a computer program used for accessing sites or information on a network (such as the World Wide Web)." This is a simple, yet accurate description. A web browser "talks" to a server and asks it for the pages you want to see.

The steps for connecting to a website are shown in Fig. 10.7 and explained further.

- Types a URL for a website in browser say “www.nios.ac.in”.
- Your browser attempts to make a connection and sends the request to Web Server.
- The Web Server receives and processes the request.
- The Web Server responds to the request with the home page of the website.
- The webpage is displayed by your browser and the connection between the server and your browser is closed.

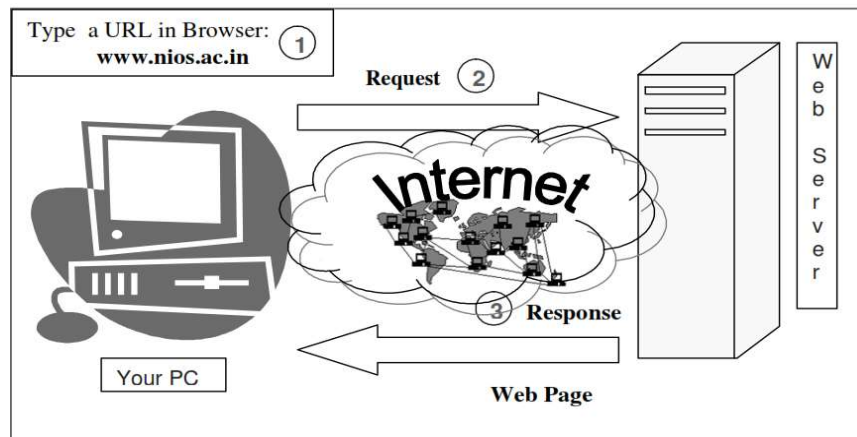


Figure 4.16: Interaction between a Web browser and a Web Server

How a Browser Retrieves a Web Page: - The browser application retrieves (or fetches) code, usually written in HTML (Hypertext Mark-up Language) and other computer languages, from a web server. Then, it interprets this code and displays it as a web page for you to view. In most cases, user interaction is needed to tell the browser what website or specific web page you want to see. Using the browser's address bar is one way to do this. The web address or URL (Uniform Resource Locator), that you type into the address bar tells the browser where to obtain a page or pages from. For example, let's say that you typed the following URL into the address bar: `http://www.google.com`. That's the home page of google.com. The browser looks at this particular URL in two main sections. The first is the protocol—the "http://" part. HTTP, which stands for Hypertext Transfer Protocol, is the standard protocol used to request and transmit files on the Internet, mostly web pages and their respective components. Because the browser now knows that the protocol is HTTP, it knows how to interpret everything located to the right of the forward slashes.

The browser looks at "www.google.com"—then name—which tells the browser the location of the web server it needs to retrieve the page from. Many browsers no longer require the protocol to be specified when accessing a web page. This means that typing "www.google.com" or even just "google.com" is usually sufficient.

You will often see additional parameters at the end, which helps to further pinpoint the location—typically, particular pages within a website.

Once the browser reaches this web server, it retrieves, interprets, and renders the page in the main window for you to view. The process happens behind the scenes, typically in a matter of seconds.

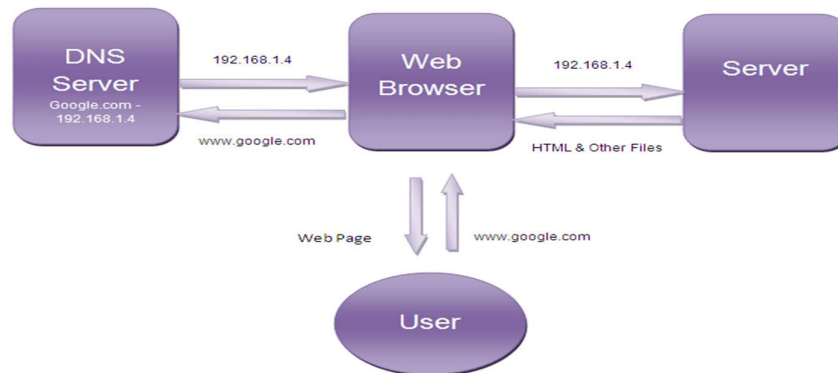

**Popular Web Browsers:** - Web browsers come in many different flavours, each with their own touches. All the best-known ones are free, and each has its own particular set of options governing privacy, security, interface, shortcuts, and other variables. The main reason a person uses any browser is the same, however: to view web pages on the Internet, similar to the way you are viewing this article right now. You probably have heard of the most popular web browsers:

- Google Chrome
- Mozilla Firefox
- Microsoft Edge
- Opera

Many others exist, however. In addition to the big players, try these out to see if any fits your browsing style:

- Maxthon
- Vivaldi
- Brave

Microsoft's Internet Explorer, once the go-to in browsers, has been discontinued, but the developers still maintain the most recent version.

## Basic components of a Web-

The primary components of the Web are shown in the following illustration. As:

- **Web servers-**

Web servers are computers that grasp data for supply over the Internet. In the example application in the diagram, one Web server might grasp the text and graphics of the online magazine what's on in Bath, and another server might hold information on which seats are available for a particular concert. The magazine would be modified using the Web's own publishing language, HTML (Hyper Text Mark-up Language). The data on given seats and their value would be held in a database with connects to particular forms that are published using HTML.

- **Servers**

Servers can be computers, Macintosh systems or UNIX system; it is the server application that makes them special, rather than the computer itself. That said, servers require being fairly up-market machines. Servers do require to be left on all the time, so that people can access the data on them whenever they want. Another prime point about servers: they are relatively hard to set up.

- **Web clients**

Web clients can be PCs, Macintoshes and other computers that are connected to the Internet and which can retrieve information from Web servers. A Web client is the computer on your desk. PCs, Macintoshes, UNIX workstations and even simple terminals can run client software. Different client software is marketed (or is given away free) for different platforms. Thus, Mosaic has both a Macintosh and a PC implementation.

- **HTTP protocol**

Http protocol is used to transmit files between servers and clients. When you click on a hypertext link or fill out a form in a Web document, the results need to be sent across the Internet as quickly as possible, and then to be understood by a server at the other end. Instructions such as 'send me this file' or 'get me that image' are carried by the Web communications protocol, HTTP. This protocol is the 'messenger' that fetches files to and from servers, and then delivers results to your computer every time you click with a request. HTTP has its counterparts in other Internet services: FTP, file transfer protocol, and Gopher are protocols that obtain different sorts of information from across the Internet.

- **Browser**

Browsers are software, which is needed by a Web client for displaying text, images, video clips and so on. This is provided under the umbrella name 'browser', of which Mosaic, Microsoft Corp.'s Internet Explorer and Netscape Communications Corp.'s Navigator and

Communicator browsers are probably the best-known examples. Browser application offers you the skill to scan data fetch from Web servers, as you would browse through a book. It also provides you services for saving and printing information obtained on the Web

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### ***3.1 INTRODUCTION***

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Inter-networking is a platform where we may meet anyone in the world. We may do any kind of project processing over the internet viz. an online book store, an online shopping of products, online universities, sending and receiving payments along with authentication etc. It involves a lot of technologies to come together to process all these tasks. Here we will describe some of the related terminologies which may use frequently while using Internet.

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### ***3.3 WHAT IS INTERNET?***

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Internet is a global system of interconnected computer networks. It is also called a network of networks that consists of millions of networks. Internet uses telephone lines, cables, satellites and wireless connections to connect computers and other connecting devices to the World Wide Web. Internet can be used to access a huge 'library' of information from the millions of websites, send and receive email messages, buy/sale goods and services, online banking, play games with other people online and etc.

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### ***3.4 TERMINOLOGIES USED IN INTERNET***

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#### **Domain Name-**

Every computer has its unique address. Every computer user using the internet has unique addresses through which we can easily identify them, more specifically, with the help of their IP addresses we may connect to their location very easily. In practice, it is used to recognize IP addresses. The key role of domain names comes in existence when we need to reach to some particular web pages. In the web URL “www.railway.com” the domain name is railway.com. Few standard top-level domains are created to segregate the related contents. Few domains' names are given below:

com – Commercial business

edu – Educational institution

gov – Government agencies

mil – Military

org – Organizations (non profit)

There are also some additional domains on internet. They include:

aero – Air-transport industry

biz – Businesses

coop – Cooperatives

tv – Television

info – Unrestricted use



**Web Browser-**

Web browser is software which enables user to access documents, images, videos, audio, and video from the World Wide Web (www). Example of a web browser are- Microsoft Internet Explorer (IE), Mozilla Firefox, Opera Mini, Google Chrome and etc.

**E-Mail-**

Email is an electronic mail that electronically transmitted through the computer. It has the capability to send message to anyone and at any time. All the emails are unique in itself that is the reason why email addresses already in use can not allowed to new users.

**FTP-**

FTP stands for file transfer protocol and provides a file transfer over the internet. It is the standard method to upload or download file over internet from one location to another.

**Homepage-**

Homepage is the first page of the browser or any website that give the details about the web site and browser.

**Hyper Text Transfer Protocol (HTTP)-**

HTTP is an acronym for hyper text transfer protocol. It is the standard protocol which is applied to view the web pages in web browsers. It is the set of rules by which web pages are transferred across the internet.

**Internet Protocol (IP)-**

IP stands for Internet Protocol. Each computer on internet can be identified by the set of dot separated four numbers and is called as Internet Protocol. One of the example of IP address is which is composed of four different numbers separated by periods is 205.134.120.60.

**Link or Hypertext Link-**

Link or hyperlink is an underline words, phrases or graphics on a web page that transfer control from one page to another page of information. That information is linked together with the help of hyperlinks and collectively gives rise to World Wide Web.

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**3.5 HARDWARE AND SOFTWARE REQUIREMENT TO ACCESS INTERNET**

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If you want your computer to connect to the huge network of other computers called Internet, it involves the adequate set of equipments and proper procedures to get connected. The steps involved are not difficult to implement. General awareness and knowledge of the hardware and provider is necessary to operate the hardware devices.

As per as hardware requirements concerns, first you need a computer system to connect to the Internet. Further requirements depend what kind of connectivity you are looking for. Such as if you want to use broadband connection for internet access then you need a DSL cable to connect to Digital Subscriber Line. Internet service provider (ISP) usually makes available this service to the internet users. For using a dial-up connectivity dial-up modem is required. Now-a-days these modems are already included in your computer system which are also known as in-built modem, otherwise you may purchase them easily too.

On the other hand, if you want to use Wi-Fi internet connectivity on your computer, then your need to purchase a Wi-Fi router and install it in your machine. Then connect its port to your modem. You may use “Ethernet Cable” for this purpose too. As per as the software requirements concern, these days all software are pre-loaded in the device you purchase. Also, you may download the required files from their websites by entering the exact model number of your device. Once you are connected with the internet, this smart software will not only get updated but also will suggest you some other relevant software that matches your preferences. In a nut shell, these days all the hardware and software requirements are fulfilled and pre-installed by the computer manufacturers. Also, they provide a complete set of drivers either in DVD or both in DVD and their websites.

### **Minimum Hardware and software requirement to access Internet-**

- A working computer system with all necessary peripherals.
- A modem and telephone line (if you are using dial up access) or any other Internet Service Provider (ISP).
- An Internet browser (such as- Internet Explorer, Google Chrome, Safari, Mozilla Firefox, Microsoft Edge, Opera, etc) and software to connect you to the ISP.

### **Types of Internet Connection-**

#### **Dial-Up Connection-**

A modem connects to the Internet after the computer dials a phone number. This is a slower analog signal is converted to digital via the modem and sent over a land-line serviced by a public telephone network.

#### **Digital Subscriber Line (DSL) Connection-**

It is an internet connection that is always “on”. This uses 2 lines so your phone is not tied up when your computer is connected. There is also no need to dial a phone number to connect to the internet. DSL uses a device named router to transport data over the network.

**Cable Connection-** Cable provides an internet connection through a cable modem and operates over cable TV lines.

**Wireless Connection-** Wireless, or Wi-Fi, Instead of cable, it uses radio frequency. Wireless is also an always on connection and it can be accessed from just about anywhere.

**Satellite Connection-** Satellite accesses the internet via a satellite in Earth's orbit. The enormous distance that a signal travels from earth to satellite and back again, provides a delayed connection compared to cable and DSL.

**Cellular Connection-** Cellular technology provides wireless Internet access through cell phones. The speeds vary depending on the Internet Service Provider (ISP), but the most common are 3G and 4G speeds. A 3G/4G is a term that describes a 3rd/4th generation cellular network.

**Very Small Aperture Terminal (VSAT) Connection-** An earthbound station used in satellite communications of data, excluding broadcast television. A VSAT consists of two parts, a transceiver and a device that is placed indoors to interface the transceiver with the end user's communications device, such as a PC. The transceiver receives or sends a signal to a satellite transponder in the sky. The satellite sends and receives signals from a ground station computer that acts as a hub for the system.

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### ***3.6 UNIFORM RESOURCE LOCATOR (URL)***

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Uniform Resource Locator or URL in short is a reference to a resource available on the internet. This term is very common in the internet terminology. URL is used to reach to a specific HTML page or some similar resources from the web. Further categories of the URL are absolute and relative URL; both of them are well used while developing the web pages.

In other words, URL is a accessible name given to some web resource based on where it resides. Most of the URLs refer to a file stored either on the same computer system or on some different machine. This external URL may access from any kind of network. However, remember that URLs also can point to other resources on the network, such as query from a database or accessing some other resource such as audio, video or some other document.

Components of URL are necessary to understand. A standard URL has two components which are protocol identifiers and name of the resource to where URL implies to. Protocol identifier is the name of the protocol which is generally http and is popularly used in our browsers.

#### **Consider the following URL:**

“http://mydomainname.com”

In the above domain name http is a protocol identifier while “mydomainname” is a name of the resource. Noteworthy here in the given URL above is, http and the mydomainname.com

both are separated by a colon sign (:) followed by two forward slashes (/). Here, protocol identifier (http) indicates the name of the protocol to be used to get one instance of the resource.

Http usually serves the http documents on the web. There are also some other types of resources on the internet used as protocol identifier such as ftp, gopher etc. On the other hand, a resource name is the complete address of the resource which is to be accessed using http. The format of the resource name depends entirely on which protocol is being used. Further, for most of the protocols the resource name contains one or more of the following components:

- Host name
- File name
- Port name
- Reference

Where host name indicates name of the computer system in which the web content resource is residing. Further, file name is the pathname to the file residing on some machine, port name is the port number to build connection and finally reference which is the optional component is referred to a named anchor which usually identifies a specific location within a file.

Generally, for most of the protocols hostname and the file name are needed, whether on the other hand the port number and reference are not forced. For instance the resource name for an HTTP url must specify a server on the network (Host Name) and the path to the document on that machine (Filename). This can also specify a port number and a reference too but are not the forced routines, as said above.

### **Characters not allowed in a URL-**

There could be a simple question that if spaces are allowed in between the URL characters. It is better to know that in RFC 1738 it is documented that the URL string can only contain alphanumeric characters and the !\$\_+\*?(), characters. In other words, if some characters other than the given are needed in the URL then they must be encoded. For example, encoding refers to change the characters into equivalent programming code.

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## **3.7 HOSTING OR WEB HOSTING**

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Web hosting or simply hosting is a facility for allowing organizations and/or other individuals for website posting or webpage posting onto the Internet. A web hosting is a kind of popular business that facilitates the technologies and relevant services that are needed for the website governance which are to be viewed in the internet. A special purpose computer system is called as server where webpages which are coupled and referenced together are hosted and sorted accordingly if required.

In a case when and intended internet users wishes to surf your website, all what they require is to type the url of your website to any web browser which they are using. As a result, their browser will connect to your server based on URL and your web pages will be delivered to

their machine too. A number of hosting companies elaborate their services as virtual hosting. Virtual hosting simply means that the services provided will be transparent and all the web sites will have their own domain name and corresponding set of e-mail addresses. In most usages, hosting and virtual hosting are same. Some hosting companies let you have your own virtual server, the appearance that is dedicated entirely to your site. Dedicated hosting is the provision of a dedicated server machine that is dedicated to the traffic to your Website. Only very busy sites require dedicated hosting. Many companies purchase their own servers and place them on a site that provides fast access to the Internet. This practice is called collocation.

### **Options for hosting-**

You must be very clear about the related terms and their application before you start hosting your website. Following services are provided as options for hosting a website

#### **Website Builders-**

This service is a type of hosting services that builds the technical skills and knowledge. In this service an online browser-based interface is provided and then the website is built upon that. The same setup hosts your website too without requiring any additional setup.

#### **Shared Hosting-**

It is another type of hosting service. In this environment, you and some other website hosting interested owner shares one server. It includes sharing of the physical server and the software application within the server. This server is affordable too as the cost being charged for the server setup will be shared between you and these other peer owners. Also, it must be considered that there are also a number of disadvantages of this shared hosting such as being slower due to sharing facility.

#### **Dedicated hosting-**

The term dedicated is given as the entire hosting environment the is for yourself. The advantage of being dedicated hosting results in faster performance. It is because of having all the control on server resources without sharing with website owners. This also means that you will be responsible for the cost of server entirely.

#### **Collocated Hosting-**

In the last, collocated hosting you will purchase your own server. Further you need to get it housed at facilities given by the web host. In this hosting, you will be responsible for the server itself. An advantage of this type of hosting service is that you have full control of the web server. Further, you as an administrator may install any required script or applications for satisfying your customized needs.

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## **3.8 DOMAIN NAME SYSTEM**

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DNS is an acronym of domain name system. It is simply a mechanic to convert an alphabetic name to a number-based IP address. In a normal practice of using any website what we do is that we simply key-in the address of that website in the address bar of the web browser. But that address is associated with some unique IP address. Here comes the role of a server which results back the IP address of the requested resource such as web page. Any of such server is the one known as DNS server. The synonym used for DNS server is hierarchical decentralized naming system. It includes computer systems, their associated services and various other resources. This system also has a DNS database which holds various DNS names which are associated with some IP addresses.

### **Protocol-**

A protocol is simply a set of rules and guidelines for making the communication among two or more communicating devices. These rules are defined for every process during communication. The communicating computers or devices have to follow the set of rules defined in the form of protocols for the purpose of communication which results in successful transmission of data.

Internet protocol (IP) is the principal set of digital message formats and rules which helps in exchanging messages between computers across a single network or a series of interconnected networks. It takes the help of internet protocol suite known as TCP/IP. In this process, messages are exchanged in the form of datagrams which are also known as data packets or packets simply. The role of IP is the delivery of data from the source host or source computer to the destination computer which is also known as receiving host.

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## ***3.9 OPEN SYSTEM INTERCONNECTION (OSI) MODEL***

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It is a standard model that defines networking framework. It implements various protocols which are simply a set of rules in layers where control goes through one layer to the next. In OSI, it is the responsibility of the lower layer to provide data or services to its adjacent upper layer. Before providing data to its upper layer the provider layer must go for a valid check, so that any error may be trapped easily before providing data to its upper layer. The OSI model defines networking which is a stack of seven layers in vertical order. The upper layers of the OSI model represent software that implements network services like encryption, decryption, connection management etc. The lower layer of the OSI stack model implements various hardware-oriented functions such as routing addresses and flow control of datagrams or ip-packets. The OSI model segregates the architecture of the network into connected seven layers in a progression which is vividly logical.

In the model, lower layer deals with electrical signals and various chunks of data in the form of 0 and 1 i.e. binary data and the routing of these data across the network. In this flow, the

higher levels deal with requests and responses across the network, representation of data and network protocols as seen from the point of view of the user.

### Layer 1- Physical layer

At this layer of the model, the physical layer of the OSI model is responsible for ultimate transmission of data bits. Ethernet cables, token ring networks are the examples of the physical layer.

At the physical layer, data are transmitted using the type of signaling supported by the physical medium. The various medium used are electric voltages, pulse of infrared, radio frequencies, ordinary light etc.

### Layer 2- Data link layer

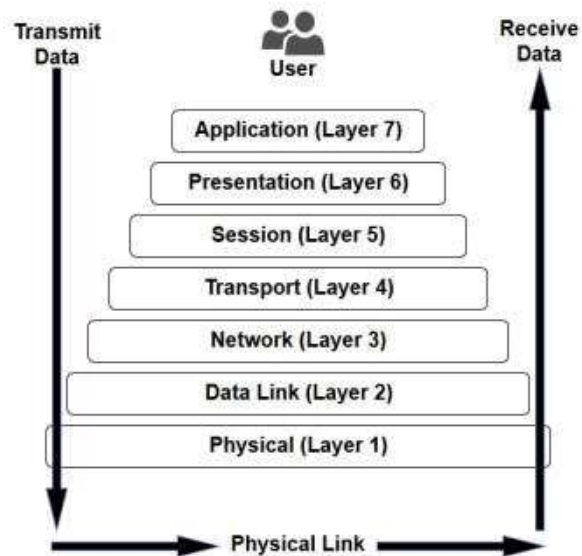
As per data received from physical layer, the data link layer checks for physical transmission errors and packages bits into data frames. Physical addressing is also managed by data link layer schemes. Such example of physical addressing schemes are MAC addressing for Ethernet networks used for controlling access of any various network devices to physical medium. Due to high load of various responsibilities it is the most complex layer of the OSI model. Further this layer is divided into two sub layers known as media access control layer and logical link control layer which further takes the responsibilities separately.

### Layer 3- Network layer

The third layer in the model holds the concept of routing above the data link layer. As the data arrives to the network layer, the source address and destination address contained inside each frame are examined to determine whether the data has reached its final destination. Further, this layer formats the data into datagram known as data packets which are delivered in the upward direction to the next layer known as transport layer for providing further services.

It is the duty of the network layer to maintain the logical addresses for devices on the network to support routing across the network. The network layer also manages the mapping between the logical and physical addresses too. In the IP networking, this mapping is accomplished through the Address Resolution Protocol.

## The 7 Layers of OSI



**Layer 4- Transport layer**

It is the duty of the transport layer for delivering data across network connections. The TCP protocol is the most common example of a transport layer. Various data transfer related protocols also supports a range of optional capabilities such as recovery from errors and flow control. It also supports for re-transmission in case of need.

**Layer 5- Session layer**

This fifth layer has a duty to manage the sequences as well as flow of events that initiate and destroy down network connections in case of need for ending a session. At this fifth layer, support for multiple types of connections that can be created dynamically and run over individual networks.

**Layer 6- Presentation layer**

The presentation layer is generally a simplest layer of all the seven layers present in the OSI reference model. Presentation layer handles syntax processing of message data such as format conversion, encryption and decryption whenever needed to support the layer above it known as application layer.

**Layer 7- Application layer**

This last layer in the stack has the responsibility of that this layer provides network services to end-user applications. Network services are typically the protocols that works with users data. For example, the application layer protocol HTTP packages the data needed to send and receive web page content in a web browser application. Finally, this layer provides data to the presentation layer.

**Cross-layer functions**

Cross-layer functions are the services that are independent but are not tied to any given layer. On the other hand, it do also affect one or more layers. The following examples are the cases of cross-layer functions:

**Management Service-** Functions that permits to configure, monitor and terminate the communications among two or more networks entities are management systems. There is a specific protocol that is known as common management information protocol, CMIP in short. It serves this layer. Further, this service needs to interact with every layer in order to deal with their instances.

- **Multiprotocol Label Switching-** The OSI model further subdivides the third layer i.e. network layers in three roles. This division is done to provide a unified data-carrying service. It can also be used to carry various different kinds of network traffics.
- **Domain Name Service-** Domain name service or DNS in short is a service available at application layer service. DNS service is used to look up the IP address of a given domain



name. In this level, when DNS server sends reply, it is then possible to form a four-layer connection or flow to the desired host.

The following table presents all the seven layers of OSI reference model along with basic services and protocols associated with each layer.

### **Comparison between OSI and TCP/IP Model-**

In the TCP/IP model, design of protocols in each layer of the internet does not concern with strict layering of the protocols in these layers. TCP/IP follows a five layer scheme where OSI follows a seven layers scheme. The five layers of TCP/IP are here compared equally with its equivalent OSI layering scheme. The comparison of TCP/IP five layers along with the OSI seven layers is below:

- The internet application layer includes the OSI application layer, and most of the session layer.
- Its end-to-end transport layer includes the elegant close function of the OSI session layer as well as the OSI transport layer.
- The link layer includes the OSI data link layer and sometimes not only the physical layers but also some protocols of the OSI network layer.

The comparisons given above are based on the original seven-layer protocol model as defined in ISO 7498.

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## **3.10 WEB SEARCH ENGINES**

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The term web search engine is defined as a software system that is developed to search the information from the internet especially from the World Wide Web. Search Engine Result Pages also known as SERPs are the search results that are presented in a line of results generally. The information of the search varies and maybe a collection of various web pages, images, video links to some websites and some other extensions files. The main part of the search engine is that it also maintains real-time information by running various algorithms on web crawler. It is a bot that browses the World Wide Web very systematically. It has various purposes in the internet. Web indexing or web spidering is also implemented by the help of the bots.

### **Search engines history-**

Web search engines were started in the year 1990. The first well documented search engine that was used to search files and contents. More specifically, FTP files Archie was debuted on 10 September 1990. Also, the world wide web was entirely indexed by hand before September 1993. That time, the count of web servers grows at a faster rate as more and more web servers existed on the web. Consequently, the central list management was getting complex.

Archie was the first tool that is used for the purpose of searching content on the Internet. It was created by Alan Emtage, Bill Heelan and J. Peter Deutsch who were students at McGill University Montreal in the department of computer science. Further, Gopher was created in the year 1991 by a computer scientist Mark McCahill at the University of Minnesota. He also led the two common search programs which were called as Veronica and Jughead. They do search like Archie used to applied. They searched the file names and titles which are stored in Gopher index systems. Specifically, veronica provided a keyword search for most Gopher menu titles. Jughead was also a tool which was used to obtain the menu information from some specific Gopher servers. Matthew Gray at MIT developed the first web robot, later in the year 1993. Wanderer was a perl language-based robot to create index. The index created by wanderer was known as wandex. The main purpose of wanderer was to actually measure the size of the World Wide Web. The second search engine of the world wide web was known as Aliweb that was developed in the November 1993. Aliweb was not dependent on any robot. It was depended only to get notified by the various website administrators.

### **Search Engine Technology-**

Normally, a search engine consists of four main components namely 'Search Interface', 'Crawler', 'Indexer', and 'Database'.

#### **Search Engine Interface**

Search engine provides us an interface that groups the search items and enables you to select and specify criteria of your interests and have the engine which finds the matching items as result.

#### **Web Crawler**

A web crawler, sometimes called a spider, is a bot (as explained earlier) that browses the World Wide Web.

#### **Indexer**

An indexer indexes the web. Web indexing are various methods of indexing the contents of a website or of the internet as a whole.

#### **Database**

A database is used to manage the data online.

### **Working of a Search Engine-**

All the above-mentioned units combined work as your search engine. Following two features are important to know about search engines:

#### **Crawling**

When a web crawler visits a web page, it starts collecting all the links on the page. Further, it adds these links in a list for visiting the further pages to visit. This process is repeated for further traversing. This process here means that any website that is linked from an indexed website will be crawled. Usually, some sites get crawled more frequently and some to greater depths.

### **Indexing**

The data from a crawl is processed and placed in the database. This is known as indexing.

### **Retrieval and Ranking**

The search engine processes your search query and returns the most relevant pages. Most search engines differentiate themselves by their retrieval methods. Ranking algorithms check your search against billions of pages to check their relevance.

### **Effective Use of Search Engines-**

Nowadays where everything and all the knowledge is available on the Internet, online research has become an essential skill. Previously the knowledge was only available at libraries and any more would need a visit to the experts but the Internet has changed that. Experts can be contacted through E-mails or video conferences and search engines have become extremely important tools, hence there is a need to learn the effective use of the search engines is important.

Search skills can be developed through practice or by reading the help pages provided by the search engines themselves. Over time one realizes what search engines are good to search what kind of information.

### **The Basics of Searching:**

Generally high number of keywords used in your search will get you more accurate results. Try to use additional keywords in your search to eliminate any unwanted results. For example, if you want to search something about Virat Kohli the Cricketer, simply searching “Virat Kohli” might get you some results of websites that mention other Virat Kohli’s that might not be the person that you’re looking for while searching for “Virat Kohli Indian Cricket Team” will get you more accurate results and will eliminate any unwanted data. Although this method may remove any unwanted data but it might miss out the results that mention Virat Kohli the cricketer but not the Indian Cricket team, therefore fine tuning your search as much as possible will give you better results.

### **Concluding remarks on effective searching**

There is no perfect search engine or search algorithm that will give you exactly what you need, however certain search engines do give you better results than others. You should take some time getting used to the different search engines and see what they have to offer. Reading the help section works very well especially when we did not get any relevant filtered content from

the search engines. Further, we may combine the help contents with the advance search options that are provided by each search engines for better filtering of the results.

### **Surfing the web**

Web surfing means to search for random various topics and search and get into information about. That is surfing randomly on various topics.

Surfing process is considered like going over through different mediums of web contents and leave the details to be filtered by the user after reading the contents and researching further FOR better and specific results. Generally, surfing is a wider term than simply browsing because in case of dubiousness on filtered material, browsing may get shaped into surfing to search for the reliable web content.

The internet media is a big and ill-managed informational juncture for those who are not tech savvy. There is a lot of material that surfer can search to make their quest for knowledge better and easier too. When looking for a specific item in this cyber active library it is easier to have a preplanning before search, and then gradually fetch the particular subject out of the result given by the internet. Most likely, using searching tools will be your first means of finding what it is that you need. When using a search tool for the first time it is suggested to have a general understanding of the tool first. You must know the proper functioning on how it works, and the type of language supported when processing with such tools. For e.g. a general search tool usually has their own and unique criteria, thus making the search for information that much more difficult matters too. Responses to a particular statement query can vary accordingly from search tool to search tool as their search algorithms are different too. Also, the same query sent by the same inspection tool may come up with various responses depending upon time, place etc, because web pages are dynamically added, removed and updated. You will experience that if you consistently use the internet, then the things which you surf most of the time that things will become less difficult for you to search in future as your experience broadens in the hand of search tools. To be more technical, this idea is called machine learning.

Today life style must include surfing the internet for petty things. Such as finding out nearby landmarks, ATMs, Hospitals, booking a taxi etc. and this has become our daily routine practice. Using internet we do several things viz. online shopping for various things, doing social networking, disseminating various information on the internet etc. The aim of the internet is to provide solutions for our problems related to any sector or area. It is very convenient and can save us much time. In addition we can get the news of current events instantly on the internet. We can also choose what we want to know on the web. We can not only save time in searching news but also save the money for buying newspapers.

### **Web surfing vs. web browsing-**

Web surfing and web browsing are two different terms of the internet networking. The main difference is that going through or searching for a specific information on a specific website is web surfing while whereas going through information aimlessly on different subjects on the different websites is what is termed as web browsing. Usually, the internet users just keep sitting in front of the computer and go through the different websites on the internet for many hours without any aim. And often, this habit of simply clicking through the pages of the various site is termed as web browsing.

The terms surfing and browsing are generally referred to the task of searching on the internet. Most of the times, both the browsing and the surfing looks as much as the same. But, the actual difference between the two terms depends on the assigned task based on what a user might browse the internet just might just surf it. On the other hand, in general there is no difference between the term's web browsing and web surfing as both of these two processes are quite similar. Due to various varieties of the available web browsers, the type of information and their process to extract the information in these web browsers is also quite different technically.

Web searches may also be used for any kind of query such as doing the research on some topics, searching the latest news, searching the old news, looking for the current openings in any organization, paying the utility bill payment services etc.

So, based on above facts, it doesn't take any notable difference in the acting of browsing and surfing. Both the terms are commonly used by people to define the action of redirecting or switching or moving among websites. Even downloading or streaming of the audio, video or

both contents from the internet is also possible by means of web browsing and web surfing. As a result, any intended internet user may watch, read, summarize, listen to music, view and download videos by simply wandering among websites by means of web surfing or web browsing.

- IP address- Your computer and every device that connects to the internet uses an Internet Protocol (IP) address for unique identification. An IP address (IP Version 4) can look something like- 202.3.104.55
- Electronic Governance (E-Governance) is the application of information and communication technology (ICT) for delivering government services to the citizens. It is the integration of various government services between governments to citizen (G2C), government to business (G2B), government to government (G2G), government to employees (G2E).

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- Archie- A tool (software) for finding files stored on anonymous FTP sites. You need to know the exact file name or a substring of it.
- ARPANet- (Advanced Research Projects Agency Network) - Earlier name of internet. Developed in the late 60's and early 70's by the US Department of Defense as an experiment in wide area networking.
- Bandwidth- How much data traffic you can send through a connection. Usually measured in bits per second (bps). Higher bandwidth means more data transferred.
- Domain Name- The unique name that identifies an Internet site. Domain Names always have two or more parts, separated by dots. The part on the left side of the dot is the most specific, and the part on the right is the most general. For example- dictionary.com, education.com, thehindu.com and etc.

Such as- FrontPage, Dreamweaver, etc. At the time of saving HTML document, you will ensure to put an .html file extension or an .htm file extension.

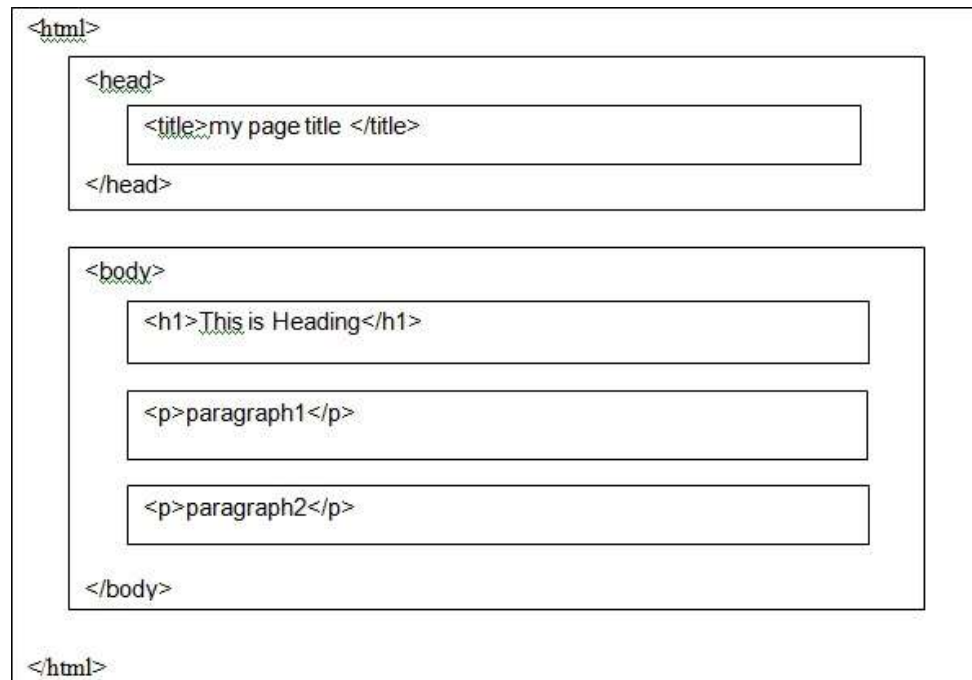

## 4.4 HTML VERSIONS

Since the early days of the web development, there have been many versions of HTML: As-  
**HTML or HTML 1.0 (1991)-**

HTML 1.0 was the first release of HTML to the world and written by Tim Berners-Lee.

**HTML 2.0 (1995)-**

HTML 2.0 was an expansion of the HTML language (HTML 1.0). HTML 2.0 was created to be a Web standard Even though the original version of HTML was never referred to as HTML 1.0.

**HTML 3.2 (1997)-**

HTML 3.0 was proposed a set of standards, released in 1995, after HTML 2.0. It would have added new features, including the ability to code tables, display mathematical equations, and allowing text flow around other objects, etc.

However, it was also designed to be backwards compatible<sup>1</sup> with HTML version 2.0. HTML version 3.0 was superseded by HTML 3.2 in 1997. It was the first version of HTML to be released as a W3C (World Wide Web Consortium) recommendation and implemented most of the features that were proposed in HTML 3.0.

**HTML 4.01 (1999)-**

HTML 4.0/4.1 was developed on the framework of HTML 3.2 and introduces several new and drastic elements that were not implemented in previous versions. Such new elements are- style

<sup>1</sup> Backward compatible refers to a software system that can successfully use interfaces and data from previous versions of the system.

sheets, scripting, frames, embedded objects, improved support for internationalization, richer tables, and enhancements to forms, etc. HTML 4 becomes a standard in April, 1998. Its updated version HTML 4.1 was published in December, 1999.

### **XHTML (2000)-**

**XHTML** was a rewrite of HTML as an XML (eXtensible Markup Language). XML is a standard markup language that is used to create other markup languages. XML content can easily be shared across applications. This feature of the language makes XML potentially very powerful.

### **HTML5 (2014)-**

HTML5 is the latest version of HTML to be standardized by the W3C. WHATWG (Web Hypertext Application Technology Working Group) began working group decided to develop HTML as a "Living Standard". A living standard is always updated and improved where new features can be added, but old functionality cannot be removed. The HTML5 was developed through collaborative efforts by W3C and WHATWG.

Initially, HTML was limited to static documents and accessed primarily by computers, but in recent years that HTML 4.0 was demanding by users to behave as “dynamic pages”. The dynamic pages behave more like applications than static documents, to use the web on different devices and platforms with high quality audio and video. The goals of HTML 5 is to replace proprietary media plug ins with open standards that allows web applications to behave like live and interactive applications.

The latest versions of browsers (such- Apple Safari, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, Internet Explorer 9.0, Opera, etc.) all support many HTML5. The mobile web browsers that come pre-installed on iPhones, iPads, and Android phones all are also have an excellent support for HTML5.

---

## **4.5 FREQUENTLY USED HTML TAGS**

---

HTML tags are element names surrounded by angle brackets-

`<tag name>content goes here...</tag name>`

- HTML tags normally come in pairs like `<p>` and `</p>`
- The first tag in a pair is the start tag (`< >`), the second tag is the end tag (`</ >`)
- The end tag is written like the start tag, but with a forward slash (`/`) inserted before the tag name.

### **Heading tag-**

Basically, there are six heading tags in HTML from h1 (largest) to h6 (smallest). As-

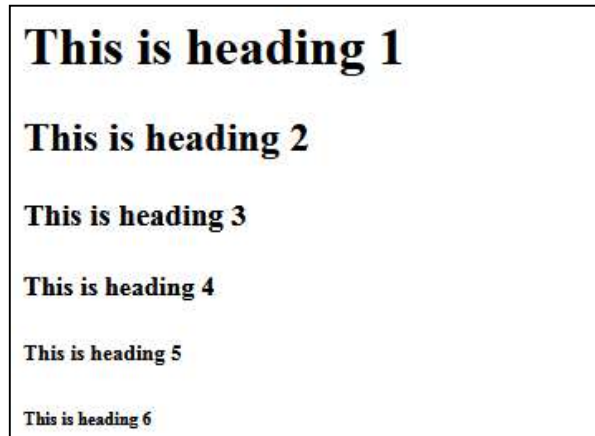

## 4.6 HTML FORM ELEMENTS

---

The form element or the form tag (<form>.... </form>) contains several elements. As- input, select, text area, button, etc. We can use several attributes to form element but two are special as- “action” and “method”.

The "action" attribute indicates the location of the script that will process the information sent by the browser, when the form is submitted. This script is written in any server-side language and is supposed to be prepared to receive and process the form's data and the "method" attribute indicates the messenger through which we can send the information stored by the form.

### Note:

The form attribute 'method' can contain the value either 'get' or 'post', which specifies the HTTP method to use when the form is submitted. As-

**Get-** With 'GET' the form data is encoded into a URL by the browser. The form data is visible in the URL allowing it to be bookmarked and stored in web history. The URL length is limited, so that there can be limitations on how much form data can be sent.

**Post-** With 'POST' all the name value pairs are submitted in the message body of the HTTP request which has no restrictions on the length of the string. The name value pairs cannot be seen in the web browser's address bar.

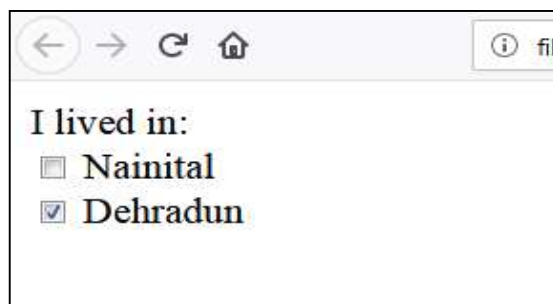

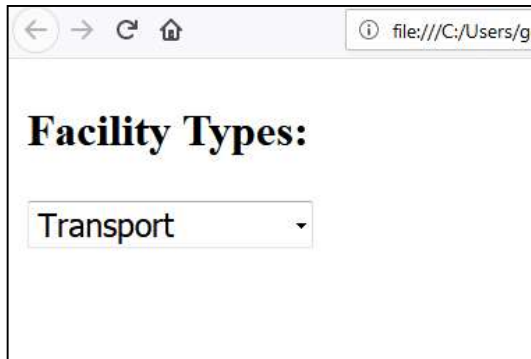

## 4.8 GLOSSARY

- Div- A block level container (or 'division' of the web page) for content with no semantic meaning.

- Head- Tag that surrounds important content that is invisible to the user, but is important to the browser. Elements within this tag contain metadata about the page and links to style sheets, scripts, etc.
- id- An HTML element can have an id attribute to identify it. id elements should always be unique to that single element, and each element should never have more than one id. As- `<div id="Detail_Sch">School Details</div>`
- Body- The body is the container for all of the page's content, Comes after the `<head>` tag, within the overall `<html>` tag.
- Comments- HTML comments are sometimes used in code to explain parts of the markup. They are similar to comments in other languages. Users do not see comments in their browser.
- Horizontal rules- This tag creates a black line one pixel thick that runs the all the way across its container. As- `<hr>`

#### ***5.1 INTRODUCTION***

---

CSS was first proposed by Hakon Wium Lie On October 10, 1994. Lie is known as the father of HTML at CERN, who has worked with Tim Berners. Because of his contribution in CSS Hakon Wium Lie is also called as father of CSS. When CSS was first proposed in the year 1994, it was well thought-out as a web styling language, so as to solve some HTML 4 problems. Other than CSS there was some styling languages proposed at that time. Some of them are Style Sheets for HTML and JSS. But CSS was better than them all.

W3C developed CSS level 2 (also called CSS 2) specifications and also published it as a recommendation in May 1998. A number of new capabilities were also included in CSS 2 which is as follows- Absolute, Bidirectional text, Concept of media type, fixed, new font properties such as shadows, positioning, z-index

Although, in 1998 CSS3 was started but some of its parts are in development stage while some of its components work on some of the browsers. On June 1999, it got published. Several



separate documents in which CSS3 is divided are called *modules*. All the new capabilities or extended features added by each module are distinct in CSS2.

## 5.3 SELECTOR AND DECLARATION

---

CSS is an acronym of Cascading Style Sheets. It's a rule-based language and opted to pertain styling to HTML elements. The Properties of element such as color, background color, width, border thickness, font size, etc. can be modified by opting or writing CSS rules in HTML elements such as <p>, <img> and many more.

### CSS rules

The rules of CSS are divided into two parts- Selector and Declaration

#### Selector and Declaration-

In CSS, selectors are the patterns which are opted to opt for the element(s) which we want to style. This part of CSS comprises of properties and the values correspondingly.

#### Selector-

Selectors are opted to locate or opt for the contents we want to style. That are integrated in the CSS rules set. Selectors in CSS necessitate id, class, type, attribute etc. to employ the style. Compound selectors moreover are distinct at a time, while in this case every selector is separated from other selectors by opting comma separator. Example of opting multiple selectors in a single block is mentioned below-

Example-

h1,h2,h3

#### Property and Value

The property is the style attribute we require to change and value is the value of particular attribute. For example, we would like to change the size of our text 28px and the color is blue then it declares as-

Example-

Here font-size is the property and 28px is their value and color is also a property and the blue is there value.

## **Declaration-**

Declaration part of the CSS comprises the property and value. For example, if we crave for the size of our text 10px then it declares as font-size:1px. In this font-size is the property and 10px is their value, and all this statement is called declaration.

## **Declaration Block**

In the Declaration Block (given in the diagram above) several lines are integrated which also includes the curly braces. This block is worn for declaring the properties of the selector. The declaration part is also alienated into two parts which are detached by a ':' symbol called as colon. The example is given below:

As shown in the above code property (font-size) and value (12px) are separated by a colon symbol.

## **Curly Braces**

In the declaration section if one property is opted then there is no need to end it or opting semicolon at the end of the line. If declaration part consists numerous properties and their values, then it must be ended with a separator, called semicolon.

## **Class and ID in CSS-**

HTML elements are applied in CSS with selectors Class and ID. When applying CSS on HTML elements at that time ID and class selectors are mainly opted. CSS would be functional in an HTML element by opting any of these two-selector id and class. The benefit of id and class is that there is no need to write code again and again. That is the feature of CSS called, reusability.

## **ID Selector**

With the opts of ID selector we can indicate a style for a single, unique element. So that the id attribute of the CSS on HTML element is opted and is distinct with a hash sign. The syntax of opting ID is given below:

### Class Selector-

To state style for a set of elements the class selector is opted. An id selector, class selector permits us to set a particular style for many HTML elements with the same class. HTML attributes, are opted by class selector which are distinct with a '.' (dot) sign.


In the below example we declare a class with name "left" (.left) which is opted many HTML attribute for display that particular element in left. The example of opting class selector is given below:

## 5.4 STYLING BACKGROUNDS IN CSS

---

The background property of CSS is opted to distinct the background effects on HTML element. It is opted to set one or more background images for an element. The background of an element is the total size of an element, including padding and border (but not the margin). There are 5 CSS background properties that affect the HTML elements.

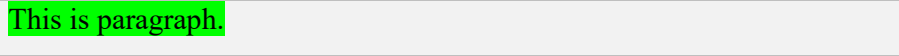
- background-color
- background-image
- background-repeat
- background-position
- background-attachment

### CSS Background Color-

The background-color property is opted to set the background color of the HTML element. Example-

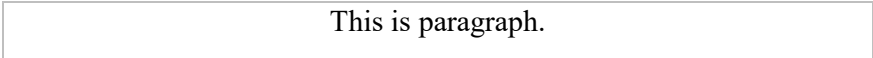

### **CSS Background Position-**

## **5.5 FONT AND FONT STYLING**

---

CSS font is opted for design text or font for display on web page. CSS font properties distinct the font family, boldness, size, and the style of a text.

### **Font Style-**

Font style property is opted to set the font style for a text. Font style property has three values, they are:

- Normal: When normal is opted, the text is shown normally.

- Italic: When italic is opted, the text is shown in italics.
- Oblique: When oblique is opted, the text is shown "leaning" (oblique is very similar to italic, but less supported).

Example of opting font style is depicted in the example given below-

The em size unit is suggested by the W3C. 1em is equal to the default text size in browsers (16px). It permits optrs to resize the text (in the browser menu), many developers opt em instead of pixels. The formula which is opted to convert pixels to em is given below-

## 5.6 PSEUDO CLASSES

A pseudo-class is a keyword which we can add to CSS selectors in order to distinct a special state of the belonging HTML element. For example, :hover can be opted to change a link's color when the mouse hovers over it.

A pseudo-class can't exist on its own. It must be close to a selector. The pseudo-class will only distinct a picky state of that selector. It has the following syntax-

selector:pseudo-class {property: value}

CSS classes can also be opted with pseudo-classes as given below-

selector.class:pseudo-class {property: value}

The most commonly opted pseudo-classes are given in the table below-

| Value    | Description  |

| :link    | Opt this class to add special style to an unvisited link.                      |
| :visited | Opt this class to add special style to a visited link.                         |

- a:active must come after a:hover in the CSS definition in order to be effective.
- Pseudo-class names are not case-sensitive.
- Pseudo-class is different from CSS classes but they can be combined.

### The :link pseudo class-

The following example demonstrates how to opt the :link class to set the link color. Possible values could be any color name in any valid format.

## The :lang pseudo-class

The language pseudo-class :lang, permits constructing selectors based on the language setting for specific tags.

This class is optful in documents that must appeal to multiple languages that have different conventions for certain language constructs. For example, the French language typically opts angle brackets (< and >) for quoting purposes, while the English language opts quote marks (' and ').

In a document that needs to address this difference, we can opt the :lang pseudo-class to change the quote marks appropriately. The following code changes the <blockquote> tag appropriately for the language being opted:

Syntax of lang pseudo class selector is-

It helps us to opt for any HTML element targeted by the selector, if it has the lang attribute value set to the specified language code. The example of opting it is given below-

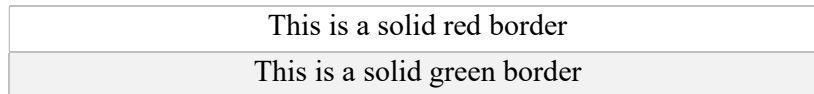

#### **6.1 INTRODUCTION**

---

The CSS means Cascading Style Sheets. It indicates that the HTML elements displayed on screen, paper, or in other type of media. It saves a lot of work. By using Cascading Style Sheets programmer can control the layout of many web pages all at once. These CSS are stored in the file of .css extensions file.

Cascading Style Sheet is opted to define styles of the web pages. It also defines the web page design, layout and variations in display for different types of the devices and their screen size. This way CSS solved a big problem. However, HTML is not more focused on formatting a web page and it does not contain more formatting tags.

### 6.3 CSS BASICS

The HTML was developed to **describe the content** of the web pages. As-

```
<h1>This is first heading</h1>
```

```
<p>This is first paragraph. </p>
```

Primarily the number of tags is available in HTML. Lately tags like <font>, color etc. attributes were added in the HTML version. It was a giant progress for web designers. The Font and color tags were typically added to every single page for the Development of bulky websites but it was very long, expensive and boring process. Therefore to solve this problem, the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) has created Cascading Style Sheets.

This way the CSS is opted for the style formatting and HTML is no longer opted for style formatting of any web page and CSS Saves a Lot of Works in recent time. Normally all the style settings are saved in external .css files. By using that file, we can change the formatting and look of an entire site by changing just one file.

#### CSS Syntax-

Following is the syntax of Cascading Style Sheets. It consists of a selector and a declaration



block-

Fig 1: Syntax of Cascading Style Sheets

The selector is a HTML element which we want to style. In the declaration block there are many declarations statement which are separated by semicolons. Every declaration has property name and a value, and which is separated by a full colon. Each CSS declaration ends by semicolon, and the whole declaration blocks are surrounded by “{}”.

As the following example where all <p> elements will be left-aligned, with a blue text color:

Example-

```
p{
    color: blue;
```

}

```

### CSS Selectors-

Cascading Style Sheets selectors are opted to "find" HTML elements on the source of their element name, id, class, attribute, and many more.

#### The element Selector

The element selector selects elements on the bases element name. In the following example all <p> elements in a web page look like-

<p> elements will be left-aligned, with a blue text color:

Example-

```

p{

    text-align: left;
}

```

#### The id Selector-

For selecting a particular element the, id selector opted the id attribute of the HTML element. This id of the element should be exclusive in entire page. The id selector is opted to select one exclusive element. For selecting an element with a specific id, user should write a hash (#) character, followed by the id of the element.

The style rule as per the following will be applied to the HTML element where id="para1"( id could not start with a number):

Example-

```

#para1 {

}

```

#### The class Selector

The class selector also selects elements with a specific class attribute. We write or start with a period (.) when we select elements with a specific class, character, and then followed by the name of the class.

In the following example, all HTML elements are having class="center", colored with red and center-aligned:

Example-

.center {

}

```

Here we can also specify that only particular HTML elements should be affected by a class. In the following example `<p>` is element and class name is "center" which is center-aligned:

Example-

With HTML elements we can also define more than one class at a time. Class name should not start with number. As in the following example, the element `<p>` will be styled according to `class="center"` and to `class="large"` both:

## Grouping Selectors

Consider the following code where different elements with the same style definitions, as:

The above code is too long. It is better to group all the selectors, so that the code could be minimized. To group selectors, separate each selector with a comma. In the following example we have grouped the selectors so that the above code could be minimized:

### CSS Comments-

We can use the comments to explain the code. It will help we at the time when we edit the source code at a later date. The Comments are always ignored by the browsers. The CSS comments are starts with /\* and ends with \*/. We can span comments in multiple lines:

Example-

## 6.4 TYPES OF IMPLEMENTATIONS OF CSS INTO A WEB PAGE

---

A browser reads a cascading style sheet, and then it formats the HTML document as per the declaration specified in the style sheet. There are three ways to insert a style sheet into a web page-

- External style sheet
- Internal style sheet
- Inline style
- External Style Sheet-

External style sheet is an external file with .css file extension. When we make changes in this file, then we can modify the appearance of an entire website. Every page of website has to include a reference of the external style sheet within the <link> element. The <link> element is specified in the <head> section. As-

Example-

```

<head>

```

We can opt any text editor to create an external style sheet. This type of file is not required any html tags. The CSS file must be saved with a .css extension.

Example of "style\_exp.css":

In the above code, we have mentioned that there should not be any space left blank between the property value and the unit (e.g. margin-left: 20px; is correct, while margin-left: 20 px; is incorrect)

### Internal Style Sheet-

If a web developer has a single page then the internal style sheet may be opted. It is defined within the <style> element, of the <head> section of an HTML page-

### Example-

### Inline Styles-

An inline style may be opted to apply a exclusive style for a single element. To use inline styles, we added the style attribute to the relevant element. The style attribute can contain any CSS property. Following example shows the change of the color and the left margin of a <h1> element:

### Example-

```

However the inline style has many drawbacks (where we are mixing content with presentation). This method should not be opted frequently.

### Managing Multiple Style Sheets-

If any properties have been defined for the same selector/element in many style sheets, the value from the last read style sheet will be opted.

### Example-

Suppose that an external style sheet has the style below for the <h1> element-

Further, suppose that an internal style sheet also has the following style also for the <h1> element-

Here the internal style is defined after the external style sheet, the <h1> elements will be "orange" it means that the value from the last read style sheet will be opted.

### Cascading Order-

In HTML elements we can opt more than one style in a sheet. They can be opted by "Cascading" a new style sheet called "Virtual Style Sheet". The rule is followed to provide the highest priority.

- Inline style
- External/Internal style sheets
- Browser default

In this the inline style which is inside the HTML elements has the top precedence; it means that this will override the style mentioned inside the tag<head> which is internal style sheet, or in an external style sheet, or a browser default style value.

---

## 6.5 BASICS OF CSS 3

---

In the upbringings of the CSS, CSS3 appears. It contains the new features of CSS and the previous also. The new style sheets called CSS3 have numerous advance features and properties like rounded corners, shadows, gradients, transitions or animations, also new layouts like multi-columns, flexible box or grid layouts. It's completely backwards-compatible with previous CSS versions. The new CSS3 properties are implemented in modern browsers.

### CSS3 Modules-

CSS3 has special "modules", which also have the old CSS specifications. They have been split into smaller pieces. Some new modules are added in it. Following are the some frequently used CSS3 modules. As-

- Selectors
- Box Model
- Backgrounds and Borders
- Image Values and Replaced Content
- Text Effects
- 2D/3D Transformations
- Animations
- Multiple Column Layout
- User Interface

### Difference between CSS and CSS3-

- CSS3 is an enhanced version of CSS2. It maintains compatibility with all of the previous CSS's features. It doesn't censure any of the CSS code. The CSS3 code was opted to develop a Web page with the feature of better appearance and faster loading. It also reduces the development time to prepare web pages in a user's browser.
- CSS3 also makes Web design less contingent on image files for page blueprint elements. It reduces the file transfer requests and the download time by using less number of images.
- The CSS1 mainly focused on appearance formatting.
- The CSS2 further positioning capabilities for text and objects.
- CSS3's and its added features are not supported by the older browser e.g. IE 9 or prior version.

### Include rounded corners & gradients using CSS3-

Earlier Web developers desired to design image files to add things like rounded corners for structural borders and background image gradients. But now CSS3 has same feature with a few lines of code. In CSS, a developer has to design/create a border or gradient, upload it into the

image server, place the same image on the web page and use Cascading Style Sheet to correctly position the border. In CSS3, the developer can do same with the following code as-

Example-

```
".roundBorder {border-radius:10px;}".
```

More over the Background gradients are slight bit complicated and they involve different code for different browsers. E.g. a white-to-black gradient for Chrome and IE opted the code as: ".gradBG {background: liner-gradient (white, black);}".

### **Include animation and text effects using CSS3-**

CSS3 has number of advance features to improve the web page like developers can include a text-shadow to the text also to compose it easy to read add visual stylishness. It can force the line breaks within the longer words to make them fit inside the columns with the feature of using word wrap.

Before CSS3, Web developers opted animation code in scripting languages like JavaScript, vb Script and jQuery. CSS3 provides many animation features and they can be implemented in the design layer. The W3C is continuously working for Web animation standards.W3C is also working on compatibility issues between the different types of animation techniques.

### CSS3 Defines Text Columns-

CSS3 also has the potential to split text sections into multiple columns like a newspaper. However in the CSS2 it's tricky to construct multi-column text sections and it does not involuntarily split text. This feature of CSS3 is beneficial especially with the sites whose feature is responsive design. A development technique rearranges and resizes content based on the viewing device's screen.

### CSS3 border-radius Property-

Using CSS3, we can give "rounded corners" for any element, using the property `border-radius`. Following are three examples of this property-

Example-

## CSS3 Gradients-

The CSS3 gradients allow us to exhibit smooth transitions between two or more precise colors. Previously we had to use images for these effects. However, by using CSS3 gradients developer can reduce the download time and neglect the bandwidth usage. The elements with gradients look better when zoomed.

There are two types of gradients of CSS3-

- **Linear Gradients (it goes down/up/left/right/diagonally)**
- **Radial Gradients (it is defined by their center)**

We have to define at least two-color stops for creating a linear gradient. Here the Color stops are the colors which render smooth transitions among. Beside with the gradient effect, we can also set a starting point and a direction (angle). Following is the syntax of Linear Gradient-

Syntax-

background: linear-gradient(direction, color-stop1, color-stop2, ...);
```

### Linear Gradient - Top to Bottom (default)

Following is the example of linear gradient which starts from the top. It starts from green, transitioning to yellow-

## 6.6 CSS3- TWO DIMENSIONAL TRANSFORMATIONS

---

CSS3 opted transforms to translate, rotate, scale, and skew the elements. A transformation is a procedure where an element changes shape, size and position. CSS3 helps in 2D and 3D transformations. Following are the method which is opted for 2D transformations-

- translate()
- rotate()
- scale()
- skewX()
- skewY()
- matrix()

### **Translate () Method-**

The method translate () in CSS3 moves an element from its existing position to specified position. The element moves as per the parameters specified for the X-axis and the Y-axis. In the following example here the <div> element moves 25 pixels to the right and 50 pixels down from its existing position-

Example-

### **Rotate() Method-**

## 6.8 CSS3 TRANSITIONS

---

It allows us to change one property values with another property values very smoothly. It happens over a specified duration. For transition effect, we have to consider following two points. As- (i) The CSS property that we want to add an effect to. (ii) The duration of the effect.

If duration part is not mentioned, the transition will have no effect, because it's by default value is 0. The example below shows a 50px \* 50px blue <div> element. The <div> element has also mentioned in a transition effect for the width property, with duration of 3 seconds:

The transition effect will start when the specified or mentioned width CSS property changes its value. In the following example a new value 200 specified as width property when user mouses over the element <div> element:

### **To Delay the Transition Effect-**

## 6.9 CSS3 ANIMATION

---

CSS3 allows us to opting animations upon the HTML elements. Here the JavaScript /Flash is not opted for the animation. Animation means to gradually change one style of element to another style. There are many CSS properties can be changed in CSS3. A user can change the property many times as he crave for. User must specify some key frames for the animation. These Key frames hold the styles of the element of specific times.

### The rule of @keyframes-

If a user mention styles of CSS inside the @keyframes rule then the animation will progressively change from the existing style to the new style in the interval of fix times. We should have to combine the animation with an element. The example below combines the animation "example" with the element <div>. The animation will last for 6 seconds, and it will progressively convert the background-color of the element <div> from "yellow" to "blue":

### ***7.1 INTRODUCTION***

---

HTML5 is an advance version of HTML. This new HTML5 standard is better than HTML 4.01, XHTML 1.0, and XHTML 1.1. We can present and structure the content on the World Wide Web (WWW) through HTML5 standard. It is a previous version HTML 4, and it was modified & standardized in 1997. On 28 October 2014, it was released.

The World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) and the Web Hypertext Application Technology Working Group (WHATWG) has developed HTML5. The World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) is an international community. It consists of full-time staff, Member organizations and the public. They work together to develop international Web standards. This fifth revised version of the HTML is the complete and final standard of the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C). The new standard of HTML5 includes following features-

- video playbacks
- audio playback
- Drag-and-drop which is previously dependent on third-party browser plug-ins (such as Adobe Flash, Microsoft Silverlight, and Google Gears).
- Generally, all latest browsers support HTML5. Most of the HTML5 features and functionality is used by the latest version of following Browsers- Apple Safari, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, Internet Explorer 9.0, Opera, and etc.

As well as the latest mobile web browsers support the features and functionality of HTML5. These HTML5 supported mobile web browsers are excellent and which are pre-installed on iPads, iPhones, and Android phones. HTML5 initiated many new elements and attributes. These features are very useful to develop a modern responsive website.

## **7.3 IMPORTANCE AND ADVANTAGES OF HTML5**

---

Mutuality-

As per the modern-day need, the websites should be more interactive. So, the programmer needs to develop highly interactive web page. So, the latest Web pages needs to include- fluid animations, stream video, play music and Social Network sites like Facebook and Twitter into the websites.

Presently above features are integrated with the help of the web tools like Flash or Silverlight, Flex or java script. But these tools are very complex to develop a web page and they also increase the complexity of web page. With help of HTML5, we can embed-

- Video and audio
- High-quality drawings
- Charts
- Animation
- Many rich contents without using any plug-ins or third-party programs

**Cleaner markup / Improved Code-**

The code used in HTML 5 is very neat and clean.

#### Improved Semantics-

We can increase more the semantic value of web page by using HTML5 elements because its codes are very standard.

#### Elegant forms-

The form developed in HTML5 is very user friendly and their graphics is very improved in design. It enhances user interface. It provides different type of text inputs, search and different fields for different purpose.

#### Consistency-

The websites based on the new HTML5 has more consistency as compare to normal web site. For web programmer and developer, it is very easier to easily and quickly understand how a web page is structured.

#### Improved Accessibility-

Using HTML5 different technologies can enhance their features and the page designed by it, has improved understanding and look.

#### Fulfill the need of Web application-

HTML 5 has many emerging new features and standards. The new features of HTML5 is to develop more easier application with effective front-ends, drag and drop tools, discussion boards, wikis and many more useful features.

#### Offline Application cache-

Different latest internet browsers have their own kind of caching mechanism. When after some time user again browses, he opens his computer, laptop and press the Back button in his browser. He can see his previous page that was opened previously. Although the user is not connected to the internet at that time. All this happen due to HTML 5. The developer can mention or specify the file which is cached by the browser, during development of web site. Therefore, that cached page loaded correctly when user is offline or he refreshes the page. This type of caching is very beneficial it gives many benefits as-

- files load much faster
- offline browsing
- reduced load on server

#### Client-side database-

As we know that the cookies are used to track unique user data. The cookie data is added with each HTTP request header. By using HTML5 user can reduce cookie size with help of session Storage and local Storage. They are two different storages in HTML5 in place of cookies.



### Geo-location support-

Anybody can find your location in the world and also, he can share that location information to other people, with help of Geo-location support. We can also find out our IP address, our wireless network connection through it. User can find out; which cell tower his phone is connected. Dedicated GPS hardware also calculates latitude and longitude from data and information sent by satellites. The HTML5 has geo-location APIs that find the location. Geo-location can be directly accessed by any variable in HTML5-compatible browser-based application.

Overview and the various advantages of HTML5 are provided above. In case of HTML4, the programmers as well as developers use its own class/id names to provide various styles to elements: bottom, navigation, main, footer, menu, container, top nav, header, top, content, article, sidebar etc. After all, in HTML5 the various elements (<header> <footer> <nav> <section> <article>) are very easy to use. There are many more advantages of HTML5. In future the HTML5 will become an online web development tool or language.

## 7.4 HTML 5 BASICS

---

The new features and elements of HTML5 are easily integrated with multimedia and graphical content of web. If we are using HTML5 in the web then flash and third-party plug-in are not necessary to use. Following are some most important features of HTML5.

- **Semantic Elements-**  
<header>, <footer>, <section>.
- **Forms 2.0-**  
It is improved version of HTML web forms where new attributes can be introduced with <input> tag.
- **Persistent Local Storage-**  
To achieve without resorting to third-party plug-ins.
- **Web Socket-**  
It is used in web application for new-generation bidirectional communication technology.
- **Server-Sent Events-**  
Events that connect web server to the web browsers.
- **Canvas-**  
It supports a two-dimensional drawing surface, which can be in the program of JavaScript.
- **Audio & Video-**  
Without resorting to third-party plug-in, Audio and video can be embedded in webpage. With the help of audio control, browser gives user to playback, including volume, seeking, and pause/resume playback.

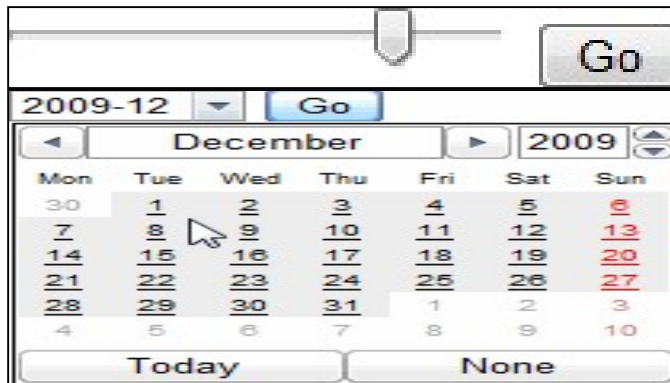

Semantic element describes very clearly their meaning to browser where as non-semantic elements do not tell about its content.

**Example of non-semantic elements are-** <form>, <table>, and <article>

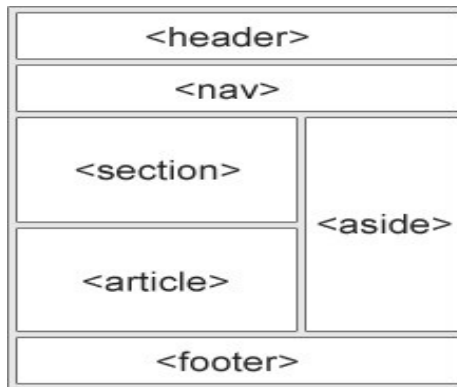

In HTML5 "alt" attribute is always used for images. This attribute is very important whenever image is not properly displaying. The width and height of image can also be defined by user. Since browser reserves some space for the image before its actual loading, it decreases flickering. As-

In HTML5, you can omit <html> and <body> tag, however it omitted. The <html> tag is the root of your web page. User also can specify the page language using <html> tag. Defining a language is very important for accessibility and for search engines.

### Meta Data (Data about Data)

#### Setting of the Viewport-

HTML5 introduced a method to let web designers take control over the viewport, through the <meta> tag. The user's visible area in HTML5 web page is known as viewport. The size of viewport varies as per the requirement. It will be larger on a computer screen and smaller on a mobile phone. So <meta> viewport element in this web page is used as follows-

<meta name="viewport" content="width=device-width, initial-scale=1.0">
```

Dimensions and scaling of web page can be controlled using, a <meta> viewport element which gives the instructions to the browser.

Here the width means the device-width, and hence the width of the page follows the screen-width of the device which will vary, according to the device (computer, phone or a tablet).

The initial-scale=1.0 part means the initial zoom level. Which is the page first that browser loads.

The two examples of web page are given as follows for the same web page. As-

### To Detect Support for Attributes-

Sometime the browser does not recognize HTML5 attributes so the newer changes and advances becomes absolute. Therefore it is important to figure out how to apply these advance attribute in such browser. There are several ways to figure this out. Mainly we have two ways. The first method is to utilize the excellent modernize library. On the other way, user can create and dissect these elements and to determine what the browsers are capable of or support. Suppose, in the previous example, as user want to determine if the browser can implement the pattern attribute, he could include a small JavaScript code in his page:

This is most commonly used method to find out the browser compatibility. Generally the jQuery library uses this type of trick. In the above example, the user is creating a new input element, and also determining whether the pattern attribute is recognized within it or not. ### **Mark Element-**

The <mark> element is like a highlighter. Any text wrapped within this tag should be appropriate to the recent activity of the user. e.g. when user has to find "Indi's best cities" on any blog, he could then utilize small JavaScript code to wrap each occurrence of this string within <mark> tags.

### **Use of <div>**

If we have already div tag, then what is the need of header, article, section, and footer tags. These tags are smarter however Div should also be utilized when there is not any better element is available for the job.

For example, suppose user has to find that he needs to wrap a code block within a wrapper element then preferably for the purpose of positioning the content, a <div> makes perfect sense. Sometime a user is wrapping a new blog post, or, perhaps, a list of links in his footer, consider using the <article> and <nav> elements, respectively then the div is more semantic.

### **The Output Element-**

The output element is used to display some part of calculation. Suppose user like to print coordinates of a mouse position, or the addition of a series of numbers, then such information should be inserted into the output element.

In the following example, suppose user has to insert the addition of 2 numbers into an empty output along with JavaScript, after pressing the submit button.

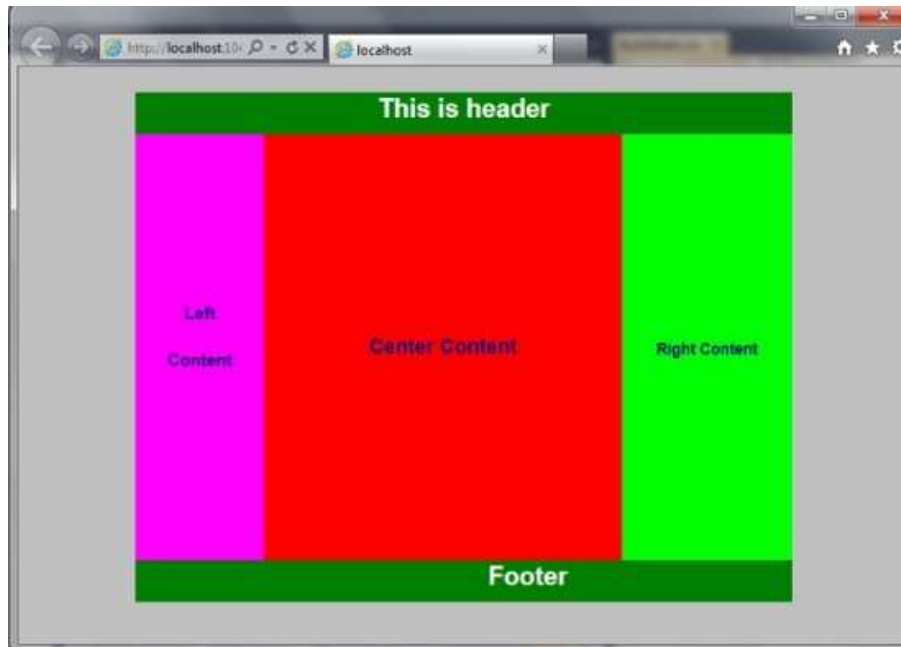
In the above example, you are creating content before and after the range input, and making their values equal to the min and max values, respectively.

### Step three: The JavaScript

- If the current browser knows what is the input range then it's ok otherwise alert the user that the demo will not work.
- And dynamically update the output element, as the user moves the slider.
- Listen for when the user mouse off the slider further grab the value, and save it in to the local memory.
- At last when, next time the user refreshes the page, the range and output will automatically be set at the level where they last time selected.

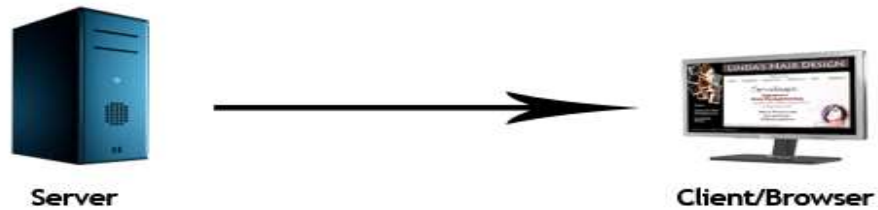
## 7.10 STATIC V/S DYNAMIC WEBSITE DESIGN

---

Generally, we categories websites into two types- Static Website and Dynamic Website. The static website is normally written using HTML/CSS (without use of database) and its pages are displayed to the user. On the other hand, a dynamic website is written by means of a server-side scripting language e.g. JSP, PHP, ASP, or ColdFusion (must use database).

**Static Website-**

This type of web site is very easy to create. Web developer doesn't need any web programming and database design/ database connectivity to create a static website. This type of web page is prepared in HTML. The HTML code is fixed for each page. Therefore, the information contained in the page does not change dynamically.



Some points about static website are-

- It's every page can differ.
- Layout of every page can be designed in a different way as per the content.
- The designer is free to mention any special effects which may be demanded by the client in a unique way on different pages.
- It is also called informational website.
- It cannot interact to visitors during web surfing.
- Modification of the content is one of the key problem.
- If you have to change anything on the website then you have to contact to the designer to have any content changes made.
- Static web pages are not scalable. If you are selling products on your site and you have a lot of products then you may have to construct individual pages for each product, then it will take considerable time, cost and effort for web development.

### Dynamic Websites-

This type website accesses content from a database or Content Management System (CMS). If you modify or alter the content of the database, simultaneously the content of the website is also altered or modified. It uses client-side scripting or server-side scripting or both and also generates dynamic content. On the basis of user input, Client side scripting generates content at the client computer and Server Side Scripting creates script for the server. In server side



scripting, the software runs on the server. When the processing in the server is completed then plain pages are sent to the user as responses. The client web browser downloads the web page from the server. After that it processes the code within the web page to render information to the user.

Some points about dynamic website are-

- Companies can develop their product pages or categories of related item or products sorted in a variety of different ways depending on how the client wants to view them.
- User can easily pull in information in an organized and structured way.
- We can create a content management system due to the ability to connect to a database.
- The Costs of the dynamic website is higher initially than for a static site.

### ***8.1 INTRODUCTION***

JavaScript is the programming language that facilitates web pages to interact with client. It presents a page more interactive and dynamic. It was formed in 1995 for web-based programming and today it also runs on your phone applications.

This script was invented by Brendan Eich in 1995, and became an ECMA (European Computer Manufacturers Association) standard in 1997. Initially JavaScript was named as “LiveScript”, but Netscape Corporation changed its name to JavaScript, possibly because of the excitement being generated by Java. JavaScript was introduced on Netscape 2.0 in 1995 with the name “LiveScript”.

#### **Features of JavaScript**

- JavaScript is a lightweight programming language.
- JavaScript is an Interpreted programming language.

- It is designed to create networking centred applications.
- It is complimentary to and integrated with Java.
- JavaScript is very easy to implement because it is integrated with HTML.
- It is cross-platform and open.

## 8.3 ADD JAVASCRIPT IN YOUR HTML PAGE

---

There is a flexibility given to include JavaScript code anywhere in an HTML Document. However, the most preferred ways to include JavaScript in an HTML file are as follows:

- Script in <head>...</head> section.
- Script in <body>...</body> section.
- Script in <body>...</body> and <head>...</head> sections.
- Script in an external file and then include in <head>...</head> section.

### Script in <head>...</head> section-

Now you want to have a script run on some event, such as when a user clicks somewhere, then you will place that script in the head as follows.

### **External file script and then include in <head>...</head> section-**

As you begin to work more comprehensively with JavaScript, you will be likely to find that there are cases where you are reusing identical JavaScript code on multiple pages of a site. You are not restricted to be maintaining identical code in multiple HTML files.

The script tag provides a mechanism to allow you to store JavaScript in an external file and then include it into your HTML files.

Here is an example to show how you can include an external JavaScript file in your HTML code using script tag and its *src* attribute.

## 8.4 PROGRAMMING VS. SCRIPTING

---

### JavaScript and Java-

JavaScript and java are both Object-Oriented Programming languages, but JavaScript is an object-oriented scripting language. They are completely different programming languages with a small number of similarities. JavaScript is mainly used in Web pages. Almost all Java expression syntax and naming conventions are followed by JavaScript. This is the main reason for calling it JavaScript. Unlike Java, JavaScript does not bother about the methods, variables and classes at all. Java is much more complex than JavaScript. Let us compare Java and JavaScript in detail.

- In Java, the source code is first converted into an intermediate code, known as the byte code. This byte code is non-readable by humans and is independent of any machine. Afterwards, this byte code is interpreted by the interpreter (Java Virtual Machine). Since JavaScript is a scripting language, it is only interpreted. So, making any modification in a Java program are more difficult than making the changes in a JavaScript program.
- Java needs the Java Development Kit. JavaScript mainly requires a text editor.
- Java is a strongly typed language instead JavaScript is a loosely typed language.
- In a Web environment, Java is a back-end language whereas JavaScript is a front-end language.
- JavaScript is considered as a part of HTML file, so it is visible in the source file. Java applets are not a part of HTML file so they are not visible in the source file.
- Java is very complex to learn due to its rules and restrictions whereas JavaScript is very easy to learn, as compared to Java.
- The User Interface of JavaScript is developed in HTML and is very easy to understand, whereas the User Interface of Java is developed in AWT or Swing, which is very complex to understand.
- The client-side is more secured in Java compared to JavaScript.
- In Java and JavaScript, routines are known as the methods and functions respectively.

- Java supports Polymorphism, but JavaScript does not support Polymorphism.
- Java uses the classes and objects to make its code reusable easily, but this service is not available in JavaScript.

JavaScript can be implemented using JavaScript statements that are placed within the `<script>... </script>` HTML tags in a web page. The `<script>` tags may be placed anywhere in your web page, but it is recommended to keep it within `<head>` tags. The `<script>` tag alerts the browser program to start interpreting all the text between these tags as a script.

The syntax of our JavaScript should be -

```
<script> JavaScript code </script>
```

The script tag contains two attributes:

- Type: This attribute value should be set to “text/JavaScript”.
- Language: This attribute specifies the scripting language we are using. Here it is JavaScript.

So now our JavaScript syntax is:

### **Programming Vs. Scripting-**

Basically, all scripting languages are programming languages. The theoretical difference between the two is that scripting languages do not require the compilation step and are rather interpreted. For example, normally, a C program needs to be compiled before running whereas normally, a scripting language like JavaScript or PHP need not be compiled.

Generally, compiled programs run faster than interpreted programs because they are first converted native machine code. Also, compilers read and analyze the code only once, and report the errors collectively that the code might have, but the interpreter will read and analyze the code statements each time it meets them and halts at that very instance if there is some error.

Scripting languages are languages that are not compiled, more like interpreted at run-time. It's like a file containing instructions for a computer to follow to carry out a task. Examples of scripting languages are JavaScript, VB script, Perl, python, php, shell script, etc.

A scripting language generally sits behind some programming language. JavaScript is extremely fast to load since most of the web browser comes with already installed components.

Tokens are the smallest individual words, phrases, or characters that JavaScript can understand. When JavaScript is interpreted, the browser parses the script into these tokens while ignoring comments and white space. JavaScript tokens fit in five categories:

- Identifiers
- Keywords
- Literals
- Operators
- Separators

### Identifiers-

Identifiers are simply names that represent variables, methods, or objects. They consist of a combination of characters and digits. Some names are already built into the JavaScript language and are therefore reserved these identifiers are called as "Keywords". Aside from these keywords, you can define your own creative and meaningful identifiers. Of course, you have a couple of rules to follow. As-

- You must begin all identifiers with either a letter or underscore ( \_ ).
- You can then use letters, digits, or underscores for all subsequent characters.
- Letters include all uppercase characters, “A” through “Z”, and all lowercase characters, “a” through “z”.
- Digits include the characters “0” through “9”.

The table below shows some examples of valid and invalid identifiers. As-

### Keywords-

Keywords are predefined identifiers that make up the core of a programming language. In JavaScript, they perform unique functions such as declaring new variables and functions, making decisions based on the present state of the computer, or starting a repetitive loop inside your application. Keywords, which are built into JavaScript, are always available for use by the programmer but must follow the correct syntax.

## Literals-

Literals are data comprised of numbers or strings used to represent fixed values in JavaScript. They are values that do not change during the execution of your scripts. The following five sections contain descriptions and examples of the different types of literals that you can use.

### Integer Literals

Integers can be expressed in either decimal (base 10), octal (base 8), or hexadecimal (base 16) format. An integer literal in decimal format can include any sequence of digits that does not begin with a 0 (zero). A zero in front of an integer literal designates octal form. The integer itself can include a sequence of the digits 0 through 7. To designate hexadecimal, Ox (or OX) is used before the integer. Hexadecimal integers can include digits 0 through 9 along with the letters. a through f or A through F. Some examples include:

### Floating-Point Literals

Floating-point literals represent decimal numbers with fractional parts. They can be expressed in either standard or scientific notation. With scientific notation, use either e or E to designate the exponent. Both the decimal number and exponent can be either signed or unsigned as shown in the examples:

3405.673

-1.958

8.3200e+ 11

8.3200e11

9.98E-12

### Boolean Literals



JavaScript implements Boolean data types and therefore supports the two literals, true and false.

They represent the Boolean values 1 and 0, respectively. The true and false keywords must appear in lowercase. As a result, the capitalized words TRUE and FALSE are left open to define as your own identifiers, but it is not recommended.

### String Literals

A string literal is zero or additional characters enclosed in double (“) or single (‘) quotes. JavaScript gives you this option, but you must use the same type of quote to surround each string. The following are examples of string literals enclosed in quotes:

“virtual communities”

‘virtual communities’

“Look, up in the sky!”

### Special Characters

When writing scripts, you might sometimes need to tell the computer to use a special character or keystroke such as a tab or carriage return. To do this, use a backslash in front of one of the special characters as shown in the following list:

## 8.6 BASIC PROGRAMMING CONSTRUCTS IN JAVASCRIPT

---

JavaScript is a programming language that adds interactivity to your website (for example: games, responses when buttons are pressed or data entered in forms, dynamic styling, and animation). For doing that you should know the basics of language, which are discussed below.

## Displaying output in JavaScript

JavaScript can “display” data in different ways:

- (i) Writing into an HTML element, using innerHTML
- (ii) Writing into the HTML output using document.write()
- (iii) Writing into an alert box, using window.alert()

### Writing into an HTML element, using innerHTML

To access an HTML element, JavaScript can use the document.getElementById(id) method. The id attribute defines the HTML element. The innerHTML property defines the HTML content:

```

## Some Basics about JavaScript

### Statement-

A statement is a line of code.

*Example:*

```
var hello = "Hello";
var world = "World";
var message = hello + " " + world;
```

This code can be executed by another program called an interpreter that will read the code, and execute all the statements in the right order.

### Case sensitivity-

All JavaScript identifiers are **case sensitive**. The variables **lastName** and **lastname**, are two different variables.

```
var lastname,                               lastName;
lastName                                   = "Naman";
lastname = "Malik";
```

JavaScript does not interpret VAR or Var as the keyword var.

JavaScript is a case-sensitive language. This means that the language keywords, variables, function names, and any other identifiers must always be typed with a consistent capitalization of letters. So the identifiers Time and TIME will convey different meanings in JavaScript.

### Semicolon-

Semicolons separate JavaScript statements. Add a semicolon at the end of each executable statement:

```
var x, y, z;
x = 5;
y = 6;
z = x + y;
```

### Comments-

Comments are statements that will not be executed by the interpreter, comments are used to mark annotations for other programmers or small descriptions of what your code does, thus making it easier for others to understand what your code does.

In JavaScript, comments can be written in 2 different ways:

#### A. Line starting with //:

```
// This is a comment, it will be ignored by the interpreter
```

#### B. Section of code starting with /\*and ending with \*/, this method is used for multi-line comments:

```
/*
```

This is a multi-line comment,

it will be ignored by the interpreter

```
*/
```

### Variables-

Variables are containers for changeable values. Variables can hold all kind of values and also the results of computations. Variables have a name and a value separated by an equal sign (=). Use the var keyword only for declaration or initialization, first time you use the variable in a document. You should not re-declare same variable twice.

JavaScript is **untyped** language. This means that a JavaScript variable can hold a value of any data type. Unlike many other languages, you don't have to tell JavaScript during variable declaration what type of value the variable will hold. The value type of a variable can change during the execution of a program and JavaScript takes care of it automatically.

*Example:*

```
var value;  
var result = 2;
```

You can also declare multiple variables with the same var keyword as follows –

```
var value, result;
```

*Example:*

This example defines two variables, after computing their addition the result is stored in third variable.

```
var x = 5;  
var y = 6;  
var result = x + y;
```

### Types of variable-

Computers are sophisticated and can make use of more complex variables than just numbers. This is where variable types come in. Variables come in several types and different languages support different types.

The most common types are:

- a. **Numbers:**
  - i. Float: a number, like 1.21323, 4, -33.5, 100004 or 0.123
  - ii. Integer: a number like 1, 12, -33, 140 but not 1.233
- b. **String:** a line of text like “boat”, “elephant” or “damn, you are tall!” (We will discuss more on strings in later section).
- c. **Boolean:** either true or false, but nothing else

- d. **Arrays:** a collection of values like: 1, 2, 3, 4, 'I am bored now'
- e. **Objects:** a representation of a more complex object
- f. **Null:** a variable that contains null contains no valid Number, String, Boolean, Array, or Object.
- g. **undefined:** the undefined value is obtained when you use an object property that does not exist, or a variable that has been declared, but has no value assigned to it.

### Strings-

This is a string.

"I love programming";

You can define strings using var keyword either using single or double quotes.

// 'Single quotes'

var str = 'Please Enter your name';

// "Double quotes"

var print = "Thank you for your input";

### Concatenation of strings-

Concatenation is adding two or more strings together to creating a larger string. This is done using the + operator.

var message = 'wow' + 'JS is easy to learn' + 'and ' + 'easy to use';

var firstName = "Alok";

var lastName = "Kumar";

var fullName = firstName + " " + lastName;

You can make sure the length of your string in JavaScript (length is the number of characters in string) just use the property *.length*

var sizeofString = 'I Love India'.length;

### Keywords-

There are some reserved words in every language which cannot be used as variables. JavaScript keywords are:

- (ii) If...else Statements
- (iii) Conditional operator

#### If Statements-

The 'if' statement is the basic control statement that permit JavaScript to make decisions and execute statements conditionally

#### Syntax

The syntax for a basic if statement is as follows:

```
if (expression){
    Statement(s) to be executed if expression is true
}
```

Here a JavaScript expression is evaluated. If the resulting value is true, the given statement(s) are executed. If the expression is false, then no statement would be not executed. Most of the times, you will use comparison operators while making decisions.

Example:

```
<html>
  <body>
    <script type= "text/JavaScript">
      var age = 20;
      if( age > 18 ){
        document.write("<b>Qualifies for driving</b>");
      }
    </script>
  </body>
</html>
```

#### If...else Statements-

The 'if...else' statement is the next form of control statement that allows JavaScript to execute statements in a more controlled way.

#### Syntax

The syntax of an if-else statement is as follows:

```
if (/* expression */) {
```



Statement executed if expression is true

```
} else {
```

Statement executed if expression is false

```
}
```

Here JavaScript expression is evaluated. If the resulting value is true, the given statement(s) in the 'if' block, are executed. If the expression is false, then the given statement(s) in the else block are executed.

*Example:*

```

      var age = 14;
      if( age > 18 ){
        document.write("<b>Qualifies for driving</b>");
      }else{
        document.write("<b>Does not qualify for driving</b>");
      }

### **Conditional operator-**

In order to avoid the if-else hassle, simple logical comparisons can be utilised.

```
var adult = (age > 18) ? "YES" : "NO";
```

In the above example, ? is a logical operator. The code says that if the value of age is greater than 18, then adult = YES; otherwise, adult = NO.

Basically, if the condition is true, the first argument is accessed and if the comparison/condition is false, the second argument is accessed.

### **Looping-**

Loops are used for statements that need to be repeated. One or more variable in the loop changes so that you can check condition to stop. You can run the same code again and again, each time with a different value. There are three types of loops.

- (i) For loop
- (ii) For ... in loop
- (iii) While loop
- (iv) Do while loop

### **For loop-**

The easiest form of a loop is *for statement*. This one has a syntax that is similar to *if statement*, but with more options:

*Syntax-*

```
for (statement 1; statement 2; statement 3) {
    code block to be executed
```

```
}

```

**Statement 1-** is executed before the loop starts.

**Statement 2-** defines the end condition when the loop had to stop.

**Statement 3-** is executed each time after the loop has been executed.

Example: for loop to print numbers from 1 to 5

```

      for (i = 0; i < 5; i++) {

### For ... in loop

A *for...in* loop is used to loop through an object's properties. As we have not discussed Objects yet, you may not feel comfortable with this loop. But once you understand how objects behave in JavaScript, you will find this loop very useful.

#### Syntax

```
for (variablename in object)
{
  statement or block to execute
}
```

### While loop-

While Loops repetitively execute a block of code as long as a specified condition is true.

```
while(condition){
  // do it as long as condition is true
}
```

Example: the loop in this example will repetitively execute its block of code as long as the variable *i* is less than 5:

```
var i = 0, x = "";
while (i < 5) {
    x = x + "The number is " + i;
    i++;
}
```

### Do while loop-

The Do/While Loop is a variant of the while loop. This loop will execute the code block once before checking if the condition is true. It then repeats the loop as long as the condition is true:

```
do {
    // code block to be executed
} while (condition);
```

Note: Be careful to avoid infinite looping if the condition is always true!

*Example:* Print numbers less than 10 using do...while loop:

```
var i = 0;
do {
    document.write(i + " ");
    i++; // incrementing i by 1
} while (i < 10);
```

Note:  $i = i + 1$  can be written  $i++$ .

*Example:* using this code you can access array with loop.

```
var myArray = ["aa", "bb"];
// for-in loop
for (var i in myArray) {
    document.write(myArray[i]+"", " "); // output is : aa, bb,
}
```

## Functions

A function is a group of reusable code which can be called anywhere in your program. This eliminates the need of writing the same code again and again. It helps programmers in writing

modular codes. Functions allow a programmer to divide a big program into a number of small and manageable functions. Like any other advanced programming language, JavaScript also supports all the features necessary to write modular code using functions. You must have seen functions like `alert()` and `write()` in the earlier chapters. We were using these functions again and again, but they had been written in core JavaScript only once.

JavaScript allows us to write our own functions as well. This section explains how to write your own functions in JavaScript.

- (i) Function definition
- (ii) Function calling
- (iii) Function parameters/arguments
- (iv) Return statement

### **Function definition-**

Before we use a function, we need to define it. The most common way to define a function in JavaScript is by using the function keyword, followed by a unique function name, a list of parameters (that might be empty), and a statement block surrounded by curly braces.

#### **Syntax:**

```
<script type= "text/JavaScript">
function functionname(parameter-list)

{

    statements

}

</script>
```

#### **Example:**

Try the following example. It defines a function called `sayHello` that takes no parameters:

```

### **Function calling-**

Calling a Function To invoke a function somewhere later in the script, you would simply need to write the name of that function as shown in the following code.

### Function Parameter/Arguments-

Till now, we have seen functions without parameters. But there is a facility to pass different parameters while calling a function. These passed parameters can be captured inside the function and any manipulation can be done over those parameters. A function can take multiple parameters separated by comma. Example Try the following example. We have modified our "sayHello" function here. Now it takes two parameters.

### Return statement-

A JavaScript function can have an optional return statement. This is required if you want to return a value from a function. This statement should be the last statement in a function. For example, you can pass two numbers in a function and then you can expect the function to return their multiplication in your calling program.

*Example:* following function that takes two parameters and concatenates them before returning the resultant in the calling program.

## 8.7 ARRAYS IN JAVASCRIPT

---

The Array object lets you store multiple values in a single variable. It stores a fixed-size sequential collection of elements of the same type. An array is used to store a collection of data, but it is often more useful to think of an array as a collection of variables of the same type.

### Syntax-

Use the following syntax to create an Array Object. As-

```
var fruits = new Array( "apple", "orange", "mango" );
```

The Array parameter is a list of strings or integers. When you specify a single numeric parameter with the Array constructor, you specify the initial length of the array. The maximum length allowed for an array is 4,294,967,295.

You can create array by simply assigning values as follows:

```
var fruits = ["apple", "orange", "mango" ];
```

You will use ordinal numbers to access and to set values inside an array as follows.

fruits[0] is the 1st element

fruits[1] is the 2nd element

fruits[2] is the 3rd element

### **Properties of array-**

- (i) Length
- (ii) Prototype
- (iii) Methods (readymade functions) of array

### **Length-**

Array length property returns an unsigned, 32-bit integer that specifies the number of elements in an array.

*Syntax-*

array.length

Return Value

Returns the length of an array.

*Example:*

```

    var arr = new Array( 10, 20, 30 );

## 8.8 OBJECTS IN JAVASCRIPT

---

It is an Object-Oriented Programming (OOP) language. A programming language can be called object-oriented if it provides four basic capabilities to developers.

- (i) Encapsulation
- (ii) Aggregation
- (iii) Inheritance
- (iv) Polymorphism

### Encapsulation

The capability to store related information, whether data or methods, together in an object.

### Aggregation

The capability to store one object inside another object.

### Inheritance

The capability of a class to rely upon another class (or number of classes) for some of its properties and methods.

### Polymorphism

The capability to write one function or method that works in a variety of different ways. Objects are composed of attributes. If an attribute contains a function, it is considered to be a method of the object; otherwise, the attribute is considered a property.

A good Example from our real life to understand an object. As- a car

A car has “properties” like weight and color, and “methods (functions)” like start and stop:

Properties- car.name=Alto, car.model = K10, car.color = white, car.type = hatchback

Methods- car.start(), car.accelerate(), car.brake(), car.stop()

### **Creation of objects**

There are two ways to create an object in JavaScript: as-

(i) Literal

```
var object = {};
```

(ii) object-oriented

```
var object = new Object();
```

### **Object Properties**

Object properties can be any of the three primitive data types, or any of the abstract data types, such as another object. Object properties are usually variables that are used internally in the object's methods, but can also be globally visible variables that are used throughout the page.

The syntax for adding a property to an object is:

```
objectName.objectProperty = propertyValue;
```

*Example:* The following code gets the document title using the "title" property of the document object.

```
var str = document.title;
```

### **Object Methods-**

Methods are the functions that let the object do something or let something be done to it. There is a small difference between a function and a method – at a function is a standalone unit of statements and a method is attached to an object and can be referenced by the this keyword.

Methods are useful for everything from displaying the contents of the object to the screen to performing complex mathematical operations on a group of local properties and parameters.

*Example:* Following is a simple example to show how to use the write() method of document object to write any content on the document.

document.write (“This is test”);
```

### ***9.1 INTRODUCTION***

---

In previous unit we have learnt about basic programming constructs of JavaScript. Now we will discuss how to handle user driven events and reply accordingly. We will also discuss objects in detail.

In this unit you will learn how DHTML can be used to develop an interactive web page and cookies can be used to store user preferences.

When users trip your web, they do things like click on text and images and given links, hover over things etc. These are examples of what JavaScript calls events.

When page loads called an event. If the user clicks on a button, that click too is an event. Other examples include events like pressing any key, closing a window, resizing a window, etc.

---

### 9.3 JAVASCRIPT EVENTS

---

Interaction of JavaScript with HTML is handled through events that occur when the user or the browser manipulates a page.

- (i) onclick event
- (ii) onsubmit event
- (iii) onmouseover & onmouseout events
- (iv) HTML5 standard events

#### **onclick event-**

“onclick” event is frequently used event. This event occurs when a user clicks the left button of his/her mouse. You can use/activate your validation or warning or etc., against this event type.

### onsubmit event-

“onsubmit” event is generated when someone submits a form. You can create form validation action against “onsubmit” event.

The example given below show how to use “onsubmit” event. Here we are calling a validate() function. The validate() function called before submitting the form data to the webserver. If this function returns true, then the form data will be submitted to the webserver, otherwise it will not be submitted to the web server.

Try the following example.

## 9.4 JAVASCRIPT OBJECTS AND PROPERTIES

---

JavaScript is designed on a simple object-based paradigm. An object is a collection of properties, and a property is an association between a name (or *key*) and a value.

Objects are variable that contain several values. JavaScript objects are containers for named values, called properties and methods.

In JavaScript, almost "everything" is an object.

- Booleans can be objects (if defined with the new keyword)
- Numbers can be objects (if defined with the new keyword)
- Strings can be objects (if defined with the new keyword)
- Dates are always objects
- Arrays are always objects
- Functions are always objects
- Objects are always objects
- All JavaScript values, except primitives, are objects.

An empty object can be created using one of two syntaxes:

- a. `let myuser = new Object();` // "object constructor" syntax, almost like Java
- b. `let myuser = {};` // "object literal" syntax

## Object properties-

We can immediately put some properties into {...} as “key: value” pairs:

let user = { // an object
  name: "Meha", // key "name" contains value "Meha"
  age: 23 // key "age" contains value 23
};
```

A property has a key (also known as “name” or “identifier”) before the colon “:” and a value to the right of it. In the user object, there are two properties:

- a. The first property has the name “name” and the value “Meha”.
- b. The second one has the name “age” and the value 23.

### Object methods-

Methods are the functions that let the object do something or let something be done to it. There is a small difference between a function and a method – at a function is a standalone unit of statements and a method is attached to an object and can be referenced by this keyword.

Methods are useful for everything from displaying the contents of the object to the screen to performing complex mathematical operations on a group of local properties and parameters.

*Example:*

Following is a simple example to show how to use the write() method of document object to write any content on the document.

```
document.write ("This is text is displayed using JavaScript document.write method");
```

### User-defined Objects-

In spite of in built objects you can build your own personalized objects in JavaScript. All user-defined objects and built-in objects are descendants of an object called Object.

The *new* operator is used to create an instance of an object. To create an object, the new operator is followed by the constructor method.

In the following example, the constructor methods are Object(), Array(), and Date(). These constructors are built-in JavaScript functions.

- a. var employee = new Object();
- c. var cars = new Array("Maruti", "Tata", "Hyundai");
- d. var day = new Date("November 17, 2010");

### The object() constructor-

A constructor is a function that creates and initializes an object. JavaScript provides a special constructor function called Object() to build the object. The return value of the Object() constructor is assigned to a variable.

The variable contains a reference to the new object. The properties assigned to the object are not variables and are not defined with the var keyword.

*Example 1:* How to build an Object.

## 9.5 CLIENT-SIDE VALIDATIONS

---

Form validation normally used to occur at the server, after the client had entered all the necessary data and then pressed the Submit button. If the data entered by a client was incorrect or was simply missing, the server would have to send all the data back to the client and request that the form be resubmitted with correct information. This was really a lengthy process which used to put a lot of burden on the server. JavaScript provides a way to validate form's data on the client's computer before sending it to the web server. Form validation generally performs two functions.

- Basic Validation - First of all, the form must be checked to make sure all the mandatory fields are filled in. It would require just a loop through each field in the form and check for data.
- Data Format Validation - Secondly, the data that is entered, must be checked for correct form and value. Your code must include appropriate logic to test correctness of data.

*Example:*

We will take an example to understand the process of validation. Here is a simple form in html format.

## 9.6 COOKIES

---

Servers and web-browsers use HTTP protocol to communicate and HTTP is a stateless protocol. But for a commercial website, it is required to maintain session information among different pages. For example, one user registration ends after completing many pages. But how to maintain users' session information across all the web pages!

In many situations, using cookies is the most efficient method of remembering and tracking preferences, purchases, commissions, and other information required for better visitor experience or site statistics.

### How cookies work?

Your server sends some data to the visitor's browser in the form of a cookie. The browser may accept the cookie. If it does, it is stored as a plain text record on the visitor's hard drive. Now, when the visitor arrives at another page on your site, the browser sends the same cookie to the server for retrieval. Once retrieved, your server knows/remembers what was stored earlier.

Cookies are a plain text data record of 5 variable-length fields:

- Expires: The date the cookie will expire. If this is blank, the cookie will expire when the visitor quits the browser.

- Domain: The domain name of your site.
- Path: The path to the directory or web page that set the cookie. This may be blank if you want to retrieve the cookie from any directory or page.
- Secure: If this field contains the word “secure”, then the cookie may only be retrieved with a secure server. If this field is blank, no such restriction exists.
- Name=Value: Cookies are set and retrieved in the form of key-value pairs.

Cookies were originally designed for CGI programming. The data contained in a cookie is automatically transmitted between the web browser and the web server, so CGI scripts on the server can read and write cookie values that are stored on the client.

JavaScript can also manipulate cookies using the cookie property of the Document object. JavaScript can read, create, modify, and delete the cookies that apply to the current web page.

### Storing cookies-

The simplest way to create a cookie is to assign a string value to the document.cookie object, which looks like this.

**document.cookie = “key1=value1; key2=value2; expires=date”;**

Here the attribute named *expires* is optional. If you provide this attribute with a valid date or time, then the cookie will expire on a given date or time and thereafter, the cookies’ value will not be accessible.

**Note:** Cookie values may not include semicolons, commas, or whitespace. For this reason, you may want to use the JavaScript `escape()` function to encode the value before storing it in the cookie. If you do this, you will also have to use the corresponding `unescape()` function when you read the cookie value.

*Example:*

It sets a customer name in an input cookie.

Now your machine has a cookie called name. You can set multiple cookies using multiple key=value pairs separated by comma.

### Reading cookies-

Reading a cookie is just as simple as writing one, because the value of the document.Cookie object is the cookie. So you can use this string whenever you want to access the cookie. The document.Cookie string will keep a list of name=value pairs separated by semicolons, where name is the name of a cookie and value is its string value.

You can use strings' split() function to break a string into key and values as follows:

Example:

Following example to gets all the cookies.

**Note:** There may be some other cookies already set on your machine. The above code will display all the cookies set on your machine.

### Setting expiry of cookies-

You can extend the life of a cookie beyond the current browser session by setting an expiration date and saving the expiry date within the cookie. This can be done by setting the 'expires' attribute to a date and time.

*Example:*

It illustrates how to extend the expiry date of a cookie by 1 Month.

### Deleting cookies-

Sometimes you will want to delete a cookie so that subsequent attempts to read the cookie return nothing. To do this, you just need to set the expiry date to a time in the past.

*Example:*

Try the following example. It illustrates how to delete a cookie by setting its expiry date to one month behind the current date.

## 9.7 DHTML

---

With DHTML, you can easily add effects to your web pages. Basically, DHTML is a combination of HTML, JavaScript, DOM (Document Object Model), and CSS (Cascade Style Sheet). It is not a language it stands for Dynamic HTML.

- (i) HTML – it supports JavaScript, CSS and DOM.
- (ii) JavaScript - scripting standard for HTML. Manipulates elements using events.
- (iii) HTML DOM - The HTML DOM defines a standard set of objects for HTML, and a standard way to access and manipulate them.
- (iv) CSS – allows us to style the layout of web pages.

**Note:** We described HTML and CSS in CWDD 101, Unit 6 and 7 respectively.

The function of a web browser (like Internet Explorer or Firefox, etc) is to read HTML documents and display them as web pages. The browser does not display the HTML tags, but uses the tags to interpret Content of the web page.

*For Example:*

```

Explanation:

- The text between <html> and </html> describes the web page
- The text between <body> and </body> is the visible page content
- The text between <h1> and </h1> is displayed as a heading
- The text between <p> and </p> is displayed as a paragraph

### HTML DOM (Document Object Model)-

It is the Document Object Model for HTML. It is a standard for how to get, change, add, or delete HTML elements.

HTML DOM methods are **actions** you can perform (on HTML Elements).

HTML DOM properties are **values** (of HTML Elements) that you can set or change.

*Example:*

The following example changes the content (the innerHTML) of the <p> element with id="show":

```

    <p id="show"></p>

    document.getElementById("show").innerHTML = "Hello World!";

In the example above, `getElementById` is a **method**, while `innerHTML` is a **property**.

### “`getElementById`” method-

The most common way to access an HTML element is to use the id of the element. In the example above the `getElementById` method used `id="demo"` to find the element

### “`innerHTML`” property-

- The easiest way to get the content of an element is by using the `innerHTML` property.
- The `innerHTML` property is useful for getting or replacing the content of HTML elements.
- The `innerHTML` property can be used to get or change any HTML element, including `<html>` and `<body>`.

## JavaScript and HTML DOM-

A JavaScript can also be used to change the content or attributes of HTML elements. To modify the content of an HTML element:

```
document.getElementById(id).innerHTML=new HTML
```

To change the attribute of an HTML element:

```
document.getElementById(id).attribute=new value
```

*Example:* The Below example changes the content of an h1 element:

- The HTML document above contains an h1 element with `id="header"`
- We use the HTML DOM to get the element with `id="header"`
- A JavaScript changes the content (`innerHTML`) of that element

Note- You also have learnt about JavaScript in CWDD 102, Unit 1.

## JavaScript and CSS-

A JavaScript can also change the style of HTML elements. To change the style of an HTML element:

```
document.getElementById(id).style.property=new style
```

*Example:* Below example changes color of heading

Explanation:

- The HTML document above contains an h1 element with id="header"
- We use the HTML DOM to get the element with id="header"
- A JavaScript changes the style.color of that element
